 he felt sure of 30 bu. of corn per acre.

Anthrax is a contagious and infect-  
 ious disease communicable to man  
 and all domestic animals. It is  
 necessary to quarantine all infected  
 farms and to destroy all carcasses of  
 animals dead from the disease. The  
 best way to do the latter is by burn-  
 ing with manure, start a fire with  
 hay, straw, or wood and then put  
 the manure on gradually until a good  
 smoldering fire is going, pile on more  
 manure which is not too dry, cover  
 the carcass entirely, if the fire is  
 properly built it will burn three or  
 four days and the carcass will be  
 entirely consumed. A slow fire does  
 better work with less work. In some  
 cases it is impracticable to burn the  
 animals where they died. In these  
 cases if they are moved a stone boat  
 with tight floor should be used and  
 all litter should be scraped up  
 and burned with the carcass and  
 quicklime spread over the place.  
 It is a good plan to fence around  
 the graves and places where sick  
 animals have dropped.


