This is the petition:
To the Honorable:
The Board of County Commissioners, Of Lincoln County, South Dakota.
Gentlemen:
We citizens and tax payers of Lincoln County, respectfully petition you, that you cause to be erected in the Court House square in Lincoln county, such monument as in your judgment seems suitable in honor of and to perpetuate the memory of all American soldiers, who may be buried in Lincoln county, and that you cause the same to be erected and paid for under the provisions of Chapter 232 of the laws passed by the tenth session of the legislature of the state, being for the year 1907.

ORDINANCE NO. 115.
An Ordinance to prevent the riding of bicycles, wheels and other vehicles upon or over the sidewalk of the City of Canton, Lincoln County, South Dakota.
The Mayor and the common council of the City of Canton do ordain:
Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to ride a bicycle, wheel or other vehicle upon or over any sidewalk in said city.
Sec. 2. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$10.00
Several violations of the above ordinance have been reported to the city authorities and city officials are instructed to see that the above ordinance is strictly enforced.
