### Obituary

Isabella M. Dunn was born at Lyons N. Y., Aug. 28, 1834, and died at Canton, Feb. 3, 1915. In 1851 she was married to Chas. M. Stanley, with whom she lived in happy wedlock until 1856, when Mr. Stanley passed on to the other world. Two boys, Charles and Frank, came to bless this union.

In May, 1871, Mrs. Stanley came with her two boys to the territory of Dakota, where, on July 31, 1873, she was married to Werter S. Smith, with whom she walked the path of life until July 18, 1898, when she again became a widow by the death of her husband. This union also was blessed with two children, Werter, who survives his mother, and Kettie-belle, who died at the age of 6 months.

At the age of 22 the departed accepted Christ as her personal Savior, and during all her long life she always lived a consistent christian life. Being kind-hearted and of a sweet, happy disposition, she carried sunshine wherever she went. She was respected, trusted and loved by all who knew her. 
