HEN NURSES BABY SWALLOWS

In Unmistakable Way She Began Right to Care for the Unfortunate Waif.

A nature freak has developed in the little town of Brookline, N. H., which for five days attracted wide attention, according to the Boston Globe.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Campbell were disturbed by peculiar sounds, which seemed to come from the floor. After much exploring, Mr. Campbell traced the sound to the chimney, and opening the flue, found at the bottom a chimney swallow's nest containing four fledgling birds.

The nest had become dislodged and fallen to the base of the chimney, where the mother bird refused to go. The little birds were not more than a day old.

He carried the nest outdoors, wondering what disposition to make of it. He felt something rub against his leg, and looking down, found one of his big prize hens.

The old bird was acting strangely, and Mr. Campbell imagined that she was looking longingly at the young swallows which he carried. He walked toward the henhouse, and the big bird kept close. Finally he put the little swallows in a nest, and immediately, with a happy cluck, the old hen took possession.

For five days she cared for the baby swallows. Every day hundreds of visitors came to see the strange sight. Summer people drove miles to see the hen feed the baby birds and cuddle them under her wings.

The sixth day Mr. Campbell went to the poultry yard and found that the five days of constant attention had proved too much and the baby swallows were dead. Opinion is divided as to whether the hen overfed the fledglings or if they died from too much handling by curious visitors.

KING OSCAR HERO OF PEACE

Sweden and Norway Honor the Memory of Monarch Who Kept Countries From Warfare.

On the Norwegian frontier the other day there was dedicated in the presence of 10,000 persons a Swedish-Norwegian monument to peace. Strange happenings when almost within hearing cannon were roaring, musketry volleying, men dying in agonies, nations wrestling in fratricidal hate. Yet not so strange after all, but in wonderfully striking contrast.

Only a few years ago Norway succeeded from union with Sweden. King Oscar of the Bernadotte dynasty, a man of gentle soul, patron of religion and art and peace, sat on the throne. It was in his power to launch the army of Sweden against the Norsemen, numerically inferior. With a word of command he might have drenched two countries in blood and tears. There were not wanting those who counseled the shedding of blood, the arbitrament of brute force, the rending of families, the wrenching of homes, the heaping of miseries on women and children. For these are the meanings of war.

But the gentle old man kept the peace. Norway became a separate kingdom in 1905. Haakon VII was elected ruler of Norway. In 1907 Oscar I died and Gustaf V became monarch of Sweden. No word of war or hate has divided the two countries. They parted in peace. They have kept the peace. And now they have erected a peace monument to commemorate the peaceful parting made possible by the heroism of Oscar I. For it took genuine heroism to face the division of his kingdoms, the humiliation of dethronement by half his subjects, and to resist the entreaties of men to whom force and bloodshed are standards of right.

The man who could thus keep the peace deserves to be held in grateful remembrance by the entire world.—Detroit Free Press.

IMPORTANT TERM IN FINANCE

Amortization Means the Providing for the Payment of Certain Sum Borrowed.

The financial world has its very own slang. Generally speaking, it is useful and excellently applied, which is not invariably the case with all slang.

Take the curious word amortization, for instance.

"Amortization" means simply the method of providing for the repayment of a loan. If you lend me \$10,000, which I promise to repay in ten years, you have a right to be interested in my plans for meeting the demand for the \$10,000 which you expect to make upon me ten years hence.

So I say to you:

"I am going to amortize that \$10,000 debt in this way: Out of my earnings every year I'm going to set aside \$900. Each year I will set the \$900 to work earning something too. At the end of ten years the fund will amount to just enough to discharge my debt."

You will find that specialists in bonds use the word a great deal. They know better than anybody else its importance. They realize that a borrower of money for a long term of years is very apt to forget to make provision for repayment.

Certain lenders of money on long terms insist upon the borrower's taking out a life insurance policy big enough to meet the debt in case of death before the debt becomes due. Generally the longer a debt has to run the more important becomes the question of "amortization."

Theodore Thompson Dead
Theodore Thompson died at his home Tuesday night. Mr. Thompson had long contended with the disease which had taken hold upon him but it was not until three weeks ago that he became unable to go about his business.

Theodore Thompson was born at Vinton, Iowa August 15, 1876. For thirty-one years he had resided in Lincoln county. In 1899 he married Lillian Nims, and of this union three children were born. The deceased is survived by the widow and two children, his mother and one sister.

The sympathy of a host of friends goes out to the family and relatives in the hour of their affliction. The funeral will be held at the home Friday afternoon at two o'clock.

The careless handling of guns by those young men greatly endangered Mr. Preston's life and it is our firm conviction that children with guns should be accompanied by elders that they, the elders should see that the proper direction for shooting was pointed out, for a careless child.

The house was beautifully decorated in pink and white and many beautiful flowers helped carry out the color scheme.


The presents from friends and relatives were beautiful and many, and made the happy couple feel that their union was the wish of their friends and the gifts, tokens of good wishes on their journey through life.
