May be Submitted to Vote—Petition For] That a petition of the character as provided in Section 40 of this act may be filed with the city auditor on any day requiring him to submit any such law, ordinance or resolution, to a vote of the electors of the city for its rejection or approval, at a special election to be held within thirty days immediately following the filing of said petition.

The attention of the voters is called to the above paragraph of the 1913 Session Laws requiring the Board of Commissioners to submit to the vote of the electors any proposed ordinance at a special election within 30 days of the filing of the same.


