The Valedictorian of the class was Miss Lillian Sandvig, who has won highest class honors during her year in high school. She has remarkable ability in the elocutionary line and even those who had heard her before felt that on this occasion, she had excelled all others. She in behalf of her classmates spoke their final farewell, as a class to their teachers and friends; and as if to inter-upt the thoughts, Misses Theima and Leta Hanson sweetly sang "Just Like Dreams" for no doubt all were thinking of their future. This train was soon broken, for Supr. Lawrence in a few well chosen words introduced Dr. W. F. Jones, of the State University, Vermillion. "The man who does things," who taking for his subject, "Signs of Life Values," gave not only to the graduates but to everyone present thoughts and facts,

they will never forget. He is a pleasant and impressive speaker. You catch and keep every word he says.
