A LETTER FROM FRENCH BATTLE FRONT

Homer Bainbridge Receives an Interesting Letter from a Friend

Homer Bainbridge received a very interesting letter from one D. W. Thorin who at one time was employed on his father's farm north of town. The letter goes far to show the spirit of the soldiers and just what they have to face from day to day.

The letter is as follows:
La Vallbonne, July 25, 1915.

Dear Friend Homer:
It is quite a long time since I wrote you a letter, but I have been busy all the time, fighting the Germans. I have been four months in the French army.

I was wounded the 4th of May at Arras. We had a hot time. Never giving quarter and asking none. I am in the Foreign Legion.

The 4th of May, we were 4000 strong and after the battle 846 answered roll call. Oh! Homer, you cannot imagine how cruel modern warfare is, and how you have to suffer.

I am now really for some place, Alsace I guess, and by the time you receive this letter, I may be in Kingdom come.

We will have heavy fighting this fall, to try and get on the German boundary. The German is a tough fighter and cruel, but he is scared to death of the Foreign Legion.

Everyone of us that is taken prisoner is shot without a hearing, so we do not take prisoners.
The Germans come with their hands up, singing "hello comrades" and have their pockets full of hand grenades and when they get close up they throw them so we take no chances.
Well, dear friend, I will have to close, wishing all good luck and I remain your friend,
