When you used to sing in the church choir—most of us have been guilty, at one time or another in our youth—you count on three selections by the organist, the prelude, the offertory and the postlude. When the choir was called upon to render an anthem, to the organ's offertory accompaniment, you felt that the choir was being overworked. Do you know who first thought of having music while the collection was being taken? Indeed, do you know where the collection box itself originated? It is such a time-honored institution that it is difficult to believe it had its inception in a Dissenter congregation in New England, only a little while before the revolutionary war. It had never been the custom to support the minister out of government funds, and too often the person had to depend on the generosity of his flock for fuel, potatoes, hams and cast-off clothing. Finally it was suggested that each Sunday the deacons should "pass around the hat." A few trials convinced the Colonists that the hat was not sufficiently dignified, and one of the tithing men proposed the use of a brass warning pin instead of the curious colonial hat. This proved an unexpected success. The jingle of the coin as it struck the brass pan betrayed the size and value of that coin. One stringy brother, objecting to this need for generosity, brought his corn popper, urging the advantage of the long handle. For this receptacle a wooden box, lined with flannel or velvet, was substituted, and to further deaden the sound, the choir was asked to sing.—(St. Louis Globe Democrat.)


Methodist Church
