Wish a Soil Analysis?

South Dakota farmers waste annually thousands of dollars planting crops upon soils in no chemical or physical condition to grow them. This is especially true of alfalfa which requires a large excess of lime in the soil. No farmer should think of sowing valuable alfalfa seed upon ground that has not been analyzed. The cost for such an analysis is very small, less than the cost of alfalfa seed for a single acre. It is no longer necessary to gamble or go by guess. A soil analysis gives the farmer the facts.

A farmer near Mitchell planted a forty acre field three times to alfalfa and could not get a stand. An analysis showed the soil was strongly acid. He lost the cost of the seed and the use of the land three years. A simple analysis in advance would have prevented all this waste. Agricultural papers tell of the need of nitrogen-gathering crops, humus, potash, lime and phosphorus. But the average farmer has no idea as to whether these are present in sufficient quantity in his soil or not. The last legislature appropriated thousands of dollars for a state soil survey. This is a move in the right direction, but it will be years before such a survey can furnish the individual farmer with the information he needs to make a certainty of his uncertainty about the condition of his soil. An accurate soil analysis gives the only solution.

Dakota Wesleyan University has just installed a complete outfit for testing soils. So many calls have come to the Chemistry Department of the University in the past from farmers all over the state who have desired to have their soils tested, that the University in response to those calls has put in this new equipment.

In order that a soil analysis may be most serviceable, the farmer should state the crop he expects to grow upon the land as the analysis will then show just what treatment, if any, the soil requires to best grow this crop. This is the season when soils should be analyzed, so the necessary treatment can be attended to before winter.

A soil analysis cannot be valuable or accurate unless the sample for analysis is properly taken. Complete directions for taking soil samples will be mailed free to all farmers interested if a letter or postal card requesting it is sent to Prof. H. I. Jones, Dakota Wesleyan University, Mitchell, South Dakota.


GREAT MUSICAL EVENT.
