NEW FUNERAL PARLORS.

J. Anderson & Sons New Building Completed and Being Settled As Rapidly as Possible.

Wednesday Joseph Anderson took the time to show us through their new cement block building recently completed. There is a full basement under the structure to be used for storage purposes. On the first floor there is a room for their hears and car. A large casket room in the center where the goods will be open for display and at the front is a small office the width of the building which is so arranged that curtains can be drawn back and this room joined with the one next to it making a homelike place which will give seating room for about one hundred people where funeral services may be held in case of need, such as a home being too small, other sickness in home or remains being sent here for burial, etc. When not in use as such the larger room will also be used as a display room.

The second floor is made into a very convenient flat with all modern conveniences which is now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Anderson. The entire building is heated by hot water, lighted by electricity and numerous large windows.

Chapels are no longer being built by funeral directors consequently Canton now has one of the most up to date funeral parlors in the state of South Dakota as the result of the enterprise of this firm.


