Notice of Annual Municipal Election Under Commission.

Notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of the City of Canton, South Dakota, that the annual municipal election under the law provided for "Cities Under Commission" is hereby called on the date, at the time and at the voting places, hereinafter designated, for the election of officers of the City of Canton, South Dakota, for the terms herein named, as follows:

One Commissioner for the term of five years, for the office of Streets and Public Property.

And notice is hereby further given to the qualified electors of Independent School District No. 1, of Lincoln County, South Dakota, embracing therein said City of Canton, South Dakota, that at the date, the time and at the voting places hereinafter designated, there will be elected the following Directors of the Board of Education of said Independent School District No. 1, for the terms hereinafter named, as follows:

One Director for the term of Five years;

One Director for the term of Four years;

One Director for the term of One year, to fill the unexpired term of a duly elected director now vacant.

Said election will be held on Tuesday the 18th day of April, 1916, at which time the polls will be open

from eight o'clock in the forenoon of said day continuously until five o'clock in the afternoon of said day at the various voting places in said city hereinafter designated and at said election there will be elected the officers above named.

Said election shall be held in the following voting places in each of the four wards of said city:

First Ward: In the basement of the Hotel Rudolph.

Second Ward: In the Sheriff's office in the Court House.

Third Ward: In the basement of the West Side School Building.

Fourth Ward: In the City Commissioners Chambers at the City Hall.
