SHARPE VS. SHARPE.

A Late Marriage Which May End in Early Divorce.

An interesting case was disclosed by the records of office business in the Circuit Court in this city yesterday. Mary A. Sharpe, aged 50 years, filed a complaint for a bill of divorce from James Sharpe, aged 72 years, to whom she was married on the 16th of October last. Mary says that after persistent appeals from James she finally consented to marry him, but only on condition that he should take her to the Chicago Exposition. To this he consented and they were married. The matrix sets forth that they went to Chicago, and that James, disregarding the solemnity of his marriage vow, did on the said 18th of October, 1884, at the Commercial Hotel in Chicago, ill-treat, beat and mistreat her; choked her and threatened to throw her out of the window from the fourth story; used indecent and insulting language; and thereafter he was so violent and abusive in conduct that she was frightened so much that she went to the parlor of the hotel and slept during that night. He left her there without paying bills and abandoned her.

THE COMMON COUNCIL.

DELAYED IN DOING BUSINESS.

Fast Driving on the Bridge—The Cable Street Railway Ordinance—Boys Must Not Catch On.

The Common Council met in regular session last evening. All members were present except Aids Brunner, More and Palmerlee. A petition was presented, signed by about eighty Canal street merchants, calling attention to the dangerous condition of the street on account of the accumulation of snow. It stated that the plows of the Street Railway Company barked up the snow in such manner as to make it dangerous for teams to drive close to walks to load and unload goods. "We are," says the petition, "in this manner engaged in transacting business, and we pray the snow may be removed by said railway company." Referred to the Aldermen of the Fourth Ward.

A petition was presented by the Street Railway company, asking permission to temporarily abandon the running of their cars on West Bridge street, owing to the unusual depth of snow, and the persistent opposition of the residents on the street to the company. On motion of Aid. Grady the petition was accepted and placed on file. A petition was presented by eight residents and property owners on Carrier's addition asking that the Council have the plat of said addition re-recorded, as the former plat was burned in a fire some years since. Referred to the Committee on Ways and Means.

The Board of Public Works, to whom was referred the resolution of Aid. Grady, relative to fast driving on Bridge street bridge, reported in substance that they thought the structure would sustain moderately fast driving with ordinary traffic; but fast driving with large traffic might produce injurious results in time. Placed on file. The Board of Public Works was given full control of the excavating and removal of the dirt to be used in the improvement of West Fulton street. The City Controller's report of the bills examined and found correct was received and orders directed to be drawn. The orders cover about \$6,000.

The Committee on Claims and Accounts reported they had examined the reports of the City Clerk, Clerk of the Superior Court and Clerk of Police Court for the month of January, and found them correct. Accepted and placed on file. The Committee on Buildings reported adversely on the petition of Mrs. A. E. Henderson, asking permission to erect a brick-veneered building on the lot at the west end of Bridge street bridge. The petition of Frank B. Wise, relative to the construction of a building in the First Ward, was laid on the table for one week. The report of the special committee, appointed to settle with the Marshal on the assessment roll for the construction of a sewer in the alley between Jefferson avenue and Cass street, from Wealthy to Wenham avenues, was adopted.

On motion of Aid. Killian the ordinance relative to the Grand Rapids Cable Street Railway Company was taken from the table and was placed on its third reading. Aid. Killian then offered the following as a substitute for Sec. 20, to stand as Sec. 24, the other sections being re-numbered by the clerk to correspond:

Said company shall within thirty days after the passage of this ordinance accept of the terms and conditions thereof, and of the rights and privileges hereby granted, by an acceptance thereof in writing, signed by its President and Secretary, and file the same in the office of the City Clerk. It shall also, within the same time, after the passage of this ordinance, file in the office of the City Clerk a certificate of the Secretary of State of the State of Michigan showing that its articles of association have been duly filed in the office of the Secretary of State. This ordinance shall not go into effect until said acceptance and certificate shall be made and filed as aforesaid within the time aforesaid. Carried.

Aid. Cregue moved to strike out in section 6 all words after the words "Cable power." Carried. Aid. Gilbert moved as an amendment to Sec. 4 that the company be required to pave between its tracks and rails from Canal up Bridge to Ransom, also on Lyon street from Canal to Lafayette. Carried. Aid. Gilbert moved to amend further Sec. 7 by adding after the words water-pipes, the words "gas pipes." Carried. Aid. Gilbert moved to amend Sec. 10 by inserting the words after the word "fare," "to be fixed by the Council." The ordinance as amended was then passed.

The ordinance in regard to the jumping on and off of street cars while in motion was carried. The assessment roll for the construction of a sewer in Lane avenue, West Bridge and Fremont streets, was tabled one week for appeals. John Canfield was granted the privilege of depositing building material at the corner of Cherry and Sheldon streets. The Clerk was instructed to advertise for the sale of property taken by the city for the purpose of opening and widening West street. Adjourned.

BAD WEATHER FOR PEACHES.

The Opinion of Judge Ramsdell on the Prospects for Next Season. The present continued cold weather gives better reason than is usual for the annual fear that the peach crop may be damaged. Judge Ramsdell, of Traverse City, who is a famous fruit-grower, and who is just now snow-bound in this city, tells a reporter that he fears next year's crop will not amount to much. He says: "The thermometer has gone below 20 this year, and it is my experience under such circumstances that the peach crop won't materialize next summer. The peach buds are very likely frozen, although owing to the depth of snow I haven't been able to get out to investigate. One winter the thermometer went to 15 degrees below, and I had a good crop, but three years ago it dropped to 20 degrees below and all my trees on the low land were killed. I may have a few peaches on my upper grounds, but I will probably be about the only farmer in Michigan who will have. Only twice in twenty years has the thermometer marked below 20 degrees. The other fruits, apples, pears, plums and the small fruits are all right."

A Letter from Him to Attorney-General Taggart.

Early this month Attorney-General Taggart, of this city, wrote to Judge Cooley inquiring whether the Judge could be induced to accept a nomination to be his own successor on the Supreme bench. The Judge's answer, which is given below, is certainly sufficiently decisive to set at rest any doubts as to his position at the time the letter was written. Following is the letter:

ANN ARBOR, Feb. 11, 1885.—Hon. Moses Taggart: DEAR SIR.—Please accept thanks for your kind note. Those of a similar nature received from others have led me to reconsider my plans and to consent, if there seemed to be a general desire that I should remain on the Bench, to do so. I must confess, however, that I had hoped, quietly to retire; and it would please me yet if by common consent some competent lawyer, of whom we have so many in the State, could be put in the place.
