Resume of the News.



In the Capital.

Secretary Hay has resumed his duties at the state department after an absence of about two weeks on account of a severe cold.

Quarters are to be established by the Panama canal commission for the Young Men's Christian association at four points in the canal zone—Ancon, Colon, Culebra and Emperor.

The president has declined to grant the applications for pardon filed in behalf of Diller B. and Samuel A. Groff, convicted of conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with the postoffice cases.

The president has signed the bill authorizing railway construction in the Philippines and conferring on the Philippine government the authority to guarantee bonds to the extent of 4 per cent of \$50,000,000.

Representative Mudd of Maryland introduced a bill appropriating \$500 for the erection of a tombstone over the grave of Maj. Piere Charles L'Enfant, whose plans were followed in laying out the streets of Washington.

Following the complaint of Anthony Comstock of New York concerning demoralizing French pictures being received in America through the French mails, the state department at Washington is seeking the co-operation of the French government to prevent the mailing of objectionable photographs or pictures.

The house committee on merchant marine and fisheries has authorized favorable reports on seven bills amending the steamboat inspection laws in accordance with the recommendations of the board of inquiry on the Gen. Slocum disaster. One of the bills permits automobiles to go aboard and ashore from ferriesboats under their own power.

From Other Lands.

Sanitary work is in progress in all the fifteen larger cities of Cuba, for which the government has appropriated the sum of \$326,000.

There is a serious dispute between Leoncavallo and Mascagni, the latter asserting that the former first commissioned him to write "Roland von Berlin."

It is stated in well-informed financial circles in London that negotiations have been completed for floating a new Russian loan of \$200,000,000 in Paris.

A ghoul working in the cemetery at Milan, Italy, digs out the bodies and cuts them up. There have been frequent recurrences of the deeds. Monday a young woman's body was disinterred and carved. The police have no clue.

The Ontario Lumbermen's association is sending a deputation to Ottawa to request a duty of \$2 a thousand on lumber imported into Canada, it being claimed that the Americans have pursued the policy of dumping lower grades of lumber in Canada.

The members of the Cuban cabinet having insisted upon resigning, President Palma has indicated that he will accept. It is expected that Senors Ortiz and Dias, respectively secretary of state and justice, and secretary of public works and agriculture, will be reappointed.

The customs house officials at Vera Cruz, Mexico, have discovered a plot to smuggle a large amount of jewelry from Germany into this country, the goods being concealed in the bottom of a large ice cream freezer. Some thousands of gold watches were among the articles seized.

Crimes and Criminals.

W. Y. Dunne, aged 80, was found murdered at his home at Vienna, Ill. He lived with his two sons. There is no trace of his assailants.

Leo F. Magnus, aged 14, shot and killed Ward B. Ing at Memphis, Tenn. Ing attacked the boy's mother. The mayor and city officials are on bond for Magnus. He was released.

Christopher Smyth, accused of committing sensational robberies on the upper West side, New York, pleaded guilty to two charges of robbery in the police court and was held for trial in general sessions.

Manuel Rego, postmaster of Koloa, Island of Kauai, has been arrested, charged with the embezzlement of \$27,077 of money order funds. To Postoffice Inspector Hare, Rego admitted that he had taken the money.

John Neigher was shot and fatally wounded by George Cavalari, proprietor of a restaurant in Chicago. The tragedy was the outgrowth of a refusal to pay for food until cigars which had been ordered were furnished.

The dead body of Rev. Martin McFarland, aged 68, was found hanging from a rope in the basement of his home at St. Louis. He had been dead only a short time when found. Ill health is given as the cause of his act.

It is stated that \$1,350 has been turned over by Police Sergeant Ellis of San Francisco, who, it is alleged, received it from Chan Chung, a Chinaman now under indictment, as a bribe to guarantee Chinese gamblers against arrest.

Charles F. Taylor, business partner of Mrs. Alice Webb Duke, has been arrested in Chicago, charged with having been implicated in the alleged swindle at Nacodoches, Tex., involving \$3,000, for which Mrs. Duke awaits extradition in New York. An attempt to secure her release on parole failed.

List of Casualties.

Two were killed and twenty injured in a wreck on the New York Central three miles west of Utica, N. Y.

Charles Donahue, Marquette, was accidentally killed at Brace's Corners, Ontonagon county, Mich., while loading logs.

Five men were drowned in Hooper's straits, off Maryland, while attempting to reach shore from ice-bound oyster vessels.

The engine of train No. 30 on the New York Central exploded at Whitesboro, N. Y., and the engineer and fireman were killed.

Fire at Montreal destroyed the Robillard estate building in St. Lawrence street; loss about \$100,000; insurance \$25,000.

The Bosen-Ryan elevator and malt plant at Cedar Rapids was totally destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$200,000.

At Mount Vernon, Ind., Mrs. Walter McCas and infant child were burned to death when the mother's clothing caught fire from an open grate.

Six of the largest office and store buildings at East St. Louis, Ill., were destroyed or badly damaged by fire and several persons were injured.

The west-bound limited on the Rock Island system was derailed near Carlizoo, N. M. Eight persons, including Mrs. A. Lesser of Milwaukee, were slightly hurt.

Harriet Pratt, aged 75, and Lela Smith, aged 5, were burned to death in a fire that destroyed the house of Charles Smith, the child's father, at Meredith, N. H.

Fire at Buffalo, N. Y., destroyed a part of the Lakeside home for women. In a panic among the fifty inmates of the place one woman was killed and four were seriously hurt.

One death and four cases of illness have been caused in Chicago by supposed ptomaines in canned tomatoes. All the sufferers are members of one family, the wife dying while seeking aid.

Running at the rate of fifty miles an hour, a mile north of Belmore, Ohio, the north-bound limited train was derailed. One passenger was killed and more than a dozen injured, one fatally.

The North Coast Limited on the Northern Pacific was wrecked at Drummond, Mont., and several passengers were hurt. Two women were severely injured and seven men were slightly hurt.

Conductor William Coyne and Brake-man Patrick Scully were roasted to death in the wreck of a caboose that was ignited by an overturned stove after a collision on the Erie railroad at Otisville, N. Y.

Fire entirely destroyed Cedar Court, the country home of Otto H. Kuhn, senior member of the banking firm of Kuhn, Loeb & Co. of New York, situated near Morristown, N. J.; entailing a loss of about \$400,000.

A Socialist convention nominated Jack London for mayor of Oakland, Cal.

The Standard Oil company has reduced the price on all grades of refined oil 1 cent per gallon.

The first national convention of the journeymen tailors' union in twelve years occurred in Bloomington, Ill.

John T. Michau, widely known as a student of archaeology, is dead at his home at St. Joseph, Mo., aged 54 years.

Mrs. Mary Clark-Culver, daughter of Senator Clark of Montana, was married at New York to Charles Potter Kling.

Thomas Adams, inventor and manufacturer of chewing gum, died at his home in Brooklyn of pneumonia and old age.

Dr. James A. Freer, a well-known physician and surgeon of Washington, was found dead at a country inn near Washington.

Joseph H. Manley, formerly chairman of the national executive committee of the Republican party, died suddenly at Augusta, Me.

Camilla Von Kleydorff, daughter of Baron and Baroness von Kleydorff of Berlin and grand-niece of Adolphus Buseh, is dead at St. Louis.

The Cleveland board of health has declared pneumonia contagious and have placed it on the list of diseases physicians are obliged to report.

Andrew Carnegie has given Rennsaeler institute of New York \$125,000 to assist in rebuilding its main building, which was burned last July.

Commissionary Sergeant Thomas J. Dolan of the Twelfth regiment, New York national guard, who had many claims to being the champion rifle shot of the world, is dead at New York after five months' illness, at the age of 52 years.

Police Commissioner McAdoo of New York announced that only 9 of the 1,500 policemen had qualified in revolver practice which was held in the armories recently.

Rose Bradley, aged 80, was baptized Sunday in the Delaware river at Philadelphia through a hole cut in the ice. The elders of the Church of God walked on the ice barefooted.

Steps to remove all advertising from the New York subway stations were taken by Mayor McClellan, who notified the subway company that the signs must immediately be removed.
