THE PERCHERON SALE

Many Out Of Town Bidders In Attendance

The N. R. and P. P. Rundell sale of registered Percheron horses, held at Sunnyside Stock Farm on Feb. 16th. was well attended and proved a success in every way.

The Rundells are pioneers in the horse business, and they have spared neither time nor money, in selecting and breeding some of the best of the breed affords.

More than thirty years ago, they brought the first registered perch-erons into the country.

No sale at Hurley, has ever brought so many bidders from a distance. The hotel accommodations were taxed to the limit; but by securing all available rooms in private houses, most of the out of town visitors found lodging. The only regrettable feature of the sale is the fact, so few of the offering remained in the county.

The great show and breeding stallion Gambier, owned by Jackson and Rundell, topped the sale at \$2000.00 selling to Lambert Keffeler of Medora, N. D. Charles Rundell of Rewey, Wis., and T. C. Kaufman, of Marion, S. D., were the contending bidders, after he reached \$1900.00.

As the top price for mares No. 17 owned by P. P. Rundell, sold to John Egan, Colton, S. D., for \$655.00. Egan later sold her to L. Bridenthal, Wymore, Neb. for a substantial profit.

The horses were distributed over six different states, and several other states were well represented by prominent bidders.

Thirty one head sold for \$12705.00 an average of \$410.00. Of this number twenty four were their own raising, nineteen were sired by Gambier, seven being under one year of age. A list of sales follows:
