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HURON ATHLETIC MEET

Will Be Held At State Fair Grounds
May 26 and 27

Huron, S. D., May 10—Over three hundred entries have been filed for the Minnesota-Dakota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Meet to be held on the South Dakota state fair grounds at Huron, May 26 and 27. This list contains the names of several record holders of the conference, many who have competed in former meets, and also others who are competing for the first time, as well. The University of North Dakota and the University of South Dakota will probably star more men, than any members of the conference, but Hamline, winners of the meet in 1914 and again in 1915, will probably enter the best individual competitors.

The time schedules have been arranged for the afternoons of Friday and Saturday, May 26 and 27. Officials for the events are all experts in field and track athletics and will run the meet off on scheduled time.

Martin Delagey of the Chicago Athletic club will again referee the meet. This will be his third year in this capacity and his record as one of the best athletic directors in the northwest is unquestionable.

The Huron commercial club is preparing to accommodate the immense crowds which are expected for the two days of the meet. Large delegations of students from the fifteen different institutions belonging to the conference will accompany their teams.

PLANT A SEED CORN PATCH THIS YEAR

The Method Does Not Involve Great Extra Labor—Plan the Patch Now

South Dakota farmers may well afford to lay out a corn breeding plot this year, suggests agronomist A. N. Hume of the state college. "Now is the time" says he, "to plan definitely in the direction of corn improvement. It is highly desirable that seed corn improvement be made by ear-row test plots, whereby the poorest yielding strains of corn in this state may be largely eliminated, and replaced with better yielding strains of our own stocks."

"The method of the ear-row test is in fact very simple. The gist of it is that kernels from each of a number of ears of corn are planted in separate rows. The rows are to be planted as nearly alike as possible in regard to the number of kernels per hill and total length of row. The rows are to be harvested separately and the corn yield of each row separately recorded."

"The yields from these separate rows thus indicate the relative producing power of the strains represented by the mother ears planted in the separate rows and it is possible accordingly to select seed corn for a following year from only the highest yielding separate rows of the ear-row test."

Test Plan is Simple

"The easiest place for conducting such an ear-row test will be probably at one end of the general field. Select the side of your corn field right now which has the best area of even ground and lay out an area of that ground, say one or more acres in extent for an ear-row test. If the rows in the ear-row test plot are to be twenty rods in length, a test plot of one acre will be eight rods by twenty rods. If the rows are planted thirty-nine and six-tenths inches apart, it will thus be possible to plant forty rows—each twenty rods long—on an acre."

"Forty rows are none too many. The greater the number of rows planted, the greater will be the opportunity for selection, but it must also be remembered that the greater the number of rows planted, the greater will be the amount of work harvesting the separate rows. All that is necessary in starting this ear-row test at the present time of year is to thus lay out the ground at one side of the general corn field and having selected the separate seed ears, to plant seed from each one in its own row."

"Obviously, it is well to mark off the ground of the ear-row test with stakes and to omit a row of corn around the ear-row test between it and the general corn field. The ear-row test plot can thus be cultivated just like the general field and at the same time without extra attention in that regard. The chief amount of extra work will be caused by the necessity of harvesting the separate rows of the ear-row test separately, but harvesting will not come until later."

Seed Plots Vital This Year

"It is now near the planting time for an ear-row test. If no plan is made for it, it will not be planted,

and if it is not planted, there will be no use to discuss the harvesting. Within the State of South Dakota if the best possible strains of corn are to be produced, there must be a large number of these ear-row test plots. They should be conducted by the most careful corn growers who will persist in such selection year after year. In order to get appreciable results for the state at large the number of these selectors should be rather large.

"If you are one of them do it now. You can select the seed ears today. Plant them with the other corn sometime in May."

SUDDEN DEATH OF HOWE MANN

Former Hurley Boy Drowned In Fox River, Ill.

The sad news reached here Monday morning of the death of Howe Mann at Carpentersville, Ill. His death occurred Sunday afternoon. He was alone at the time and was rowing up the river to meet a lady friend, a teacher in the Sunday school at Dundee. The boat capsized and before his cries for help could be responded to he was going down for the last time. His body was recovered from the river within a short time, probably twenty minutes from the time of the accident, but too late to save him.

Howe was the adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Wormwood of this city and up until the time of his going to Illinois about two years ago had always made his home here. His loss is a severe blow to Mrs. Wormwood who has had charge of him since he was a baby and had always given him the same loving care as one of her own children.

He was about twenty one years of age and was employed as book-keeper in a bolt factory at Carpentersville, Ill. He had made good on the job and his employers considered him one of the most faithful and competent young men in their service.

Funeral services were held in the Baptist church at Dundee, Ill., where he was secretary of the Sunday School, and the church was filled with mourners, practically all those connected with the factory where he was employed being in attendance. The remains were laid to rest in Rose Hill cemetery at Dundee.

Beside his father, who lives at South Elgin, he is survived by his brother Harold of Tennessee and brother Walter who also resides in Illinois.
