The Prince of Wales is enjoying a visit this week to the city of Paris.

A letter of sympathy has been received by Mrs. Garfield from Queen Victoria.

Five citizens of Chicago have been subpoenaed as witnesses in the trial of Guiteau.

Edison received a diploma of honor being the highest award in the electric exposition recently held in Paris.

On account of the general revival of business, there is great demand for wooden sailing vessels for long voyages.

A thief steals \$1,500 worth of postage stamps from the postmaster of Kalamazoo just as he is about to turn the office over to his successor.

The burgomaster of Vienna will have to ask the pope to pardon his sins for giving to the king and queen of Italy, a hearty welcome to his city.

*Expte*, a French paper, has been suppressed for calling Mahomet a false prophet. The Egyptian sheiks voted to put the editor to death, but he fled to France.

Confederate bonds are being bought and sold at the rate of \$2 per thousand for the paper. It is thought that there is a deposit of money due the Confederacy in the Bank of England of sufficient amount to pay them.

And, now, there is a rumor that Gladstone is about to retire from official life. In regard to the land league troubles he is having it all his own way, and as he is not a coward, his political enemies cannot drive him out of office.

The Pennsylvania railroad and the New York Central are racing fast trains between New York and Chicago. On Monday the Pennsylvania company ran a train from New York to Chicago in twenty-five hours and forty minutes. The "Central" expects to begin running a fast train on Sunday next between the same points daily, which will shorten the above time one hour.

The international arbitration and peace association passed a resolution recording its satisfaction with the saluting of the English flag at Yorktown. Such an incident, the resolution says, is unparalleled in history, and must ever remain of deep international interest. It regards the act as weighty and significant testimony to the eternal oblivion of animosities resulting from the war for independence, and as an emphatic expression of the brotherly love existing between England and America.

One of the largest gold bearing mineral discoveries was recently made in Summit district, Colorado, by Judge Thomas H. Bowen, of Del Norte. William H. Stevens, a celebrated mining expert, having visited and examined the mine pronounced it the most remarkable and valuable gold mine being worked in the United States. Assays are now running over \$20,000 gold per ton. The product of the mine from the stamp mill averages about \$100,000 per month in gold, and tailings from the mill show a value of \$360 gold. Bowen was recently offered \$3,000,000 cash by external capitalists for a half interest in the property, which he refused. The discovery has created considerable excitement in mining circles.

WASHINGTON, October 31.—A well dressed and powerfully built man appeared at the White House this afternoon and demanded to see the "accounts of the President." Dinsmore, doorkeeper, at once recognized the visitor as a "crank" who had called there in May last and was sent home to his friends in Pennsylvania, and with a view of delivering him into the custody of the police suggested that the accounts could be seen down the street, and that he would accompany him. The man, who gives his name as John Wolving, of Pennsylvania, then presented a letter, which, he insisted, gave him a right to enter the mansion, and endeavored to force his way in. Dinsmore seized him, and a desperate

struggle ensued, Wolving attempted to draw a revolver, but Dinsmore, who had grasped him by the throat, choked him so vigorously that he was unable to use it. Steward Crump and another employ hurried to Dinsmore's assistance, and the lunatic was with some difficulty overpowered and the revolver taken from him. It was a large-sized seven-shooter, with every barrel loaded. The police were notified and Wolving or Doctor Noetting, was taken to the station and locked up. The letter which he presented read as follows:
