**R. S. Patterson's New Departure.**

During the year 1882 Mr R. S. Patterson did a good business in musical instruments without specially trying to push that branch. Trade came and was accepted rather than sought after. Now, however, he has gone into the business extensively and keeps in stock a large assortment of pianos and organs. A fine room has been fitted up on the second floor of his establishment on Military street as a show room. In this room a Commercial representative was transported on a Reedy elevator which does away with the necessity of climbing long stairs. The room is neatly carpeted and curtained; but these are minor attractions and are lost sight of in the beautiful display of pianos and organs with which the room is comfortably fixed. Mr Patterson is now showing six square and two upright pianos and any number of organs.

Among the different makes of pianos are the Francis Bacon, both square and upright, made in New York; the Boardman & Gray, upright, made in Albany and one of the Schomaker pianos. This latter is a square piano with gold plated strings and is really a beautiful instrument. Along with these are square pianos of other manufacture.

The principal run in organs is on the Prescott, manufactured at Concord, N. H., although a number of others are kept in stock.

This is the only establishment in the city where a stock of instruments is kept on display. As this firm has a business reputation to sustain, people will be much safer in buying from them than from any agents or itinerant vendors whose sole object is to secure a sale regardless of the quality of the instrument so long as the percentage or profit is sufficiently tempting.
