FIRE! FIRE!

THE DESTRUCTIVE ELEMENT AGAIN AT WORK IN OUR VILLAGE.

Once again our citizens were rudely awakened from sound sleep by the cry of fire at about half past one o'clock last Monday morning, to find the large barn belonging to Thos. Rapley, and occupied by White & Dagg as a livery stable, all ablaze. It was not many minutes before a large crowd gathered but the flames had made too much headway to be subdued in the least, and although every effort was made nothing could be taken from the barn but one cow, and seven horses with one other cow were consumed, besides all the other contents of the barn, including numerous livery rigs and the Rapley house hack. Richard Dagg, who slept in the barn, had a narrow escape, barely saving his clothes. The snow which fell on Sunday proved a great blessing, as it kept the fire from spreading. D. G. Williams' barn, which stood close to the burning building, caught fire once or twice, but was extinguished. It is beyond a doubt but that the fire was set by an incendiary. The loss reached \$4,000. Insured for \$2,000; \$1,500 on contents and \$500 on building.


