OBITUARY.

Mrs. Isabella Russell Brown, wife of James Brown, died at their home in Brockway Centre, on Monday, April 8th, 1889, after a severe illness of more than two weeks duration. The funeral took place on Wednesday, April 10th, the services being held in the M. E. church, (by kind consent of that society), conducted by Eld. J. H. Paton; and a large gathering of all classes were present to pay their last sad respects to the departed, and to mingle their tears of sorrow and sympathy with the family. The text used on the occasion, chosen by the deceased, was 2 Tim. 1:12, expressing her full confidence in Christ, not only as her Savior, but also as the Savior of all mankind.—1 Tim. IV. 10.

The deceased was a daughter of the late Eld. David Brown, of the township of Brockway, and was born in Montreal, Canada, September 16, 1837, and was therefore at the time of her death in her fifty-second year. She became the wife of James Brown at Perth, Canada, May 16th, 1856, and they moved to Brockway, Mich., in the year 1865, and to Brockway Centre in 1872, here remaining till the end. Eight children were the fruit of this marriage, six of whom, and her husband, are left to mourn their sad loss. But they have good ground for consolation in the glorious hope of the gospel, in which she was a firm believer.

On a profession of her faith in Christ as her Lord and Savior, she was baptized in the year 1866, connecting herself with the Free Will Baptist church in the Menerville settlement, which afterward severed its connection with that denomination and repudiated the sectarian name, being known simply as the "Church of Christ, (in which her father was a well known and devoted preacher), the individual members being known as "Disciples of Christ." She has ever since remained true to the principle involved in that change, and has been a faithful student of the Scriptures, and a devoted learner—a disciple indeed—in the school of Christ, for the few last years of her life being a worshiper with the Church of Christ in Brockway Centre.

In that church she was a devoted and much-loved worker—the last public effort of her life being to assist in the building of a new place of worship, a work and its object in which she was much interested. But she passed to the church triumphant before its completion, charging others to faithfulness in the work until it should be well done.

As a result of the earnest study of God's word—carrying out the principle of true discipleship—she had become a firm believer in the final reconciliation and salvation of all mankind. While on her death bed, and in full view of her impending change, she spoke with joy of her blessed hope. To the writer she said, "I would not give the blessed assurance and comfort of this hope for all this world can give. Had I passed away eighteen years ago, it would have been with calm assurance of my own personal salvation through Christ, but now (and she looked lovingly at the dear ones around her bed) there is added to this the equal assurance that in due time I shall meet ALL the dear ones of earth in the kingdom of God. And I go to the other side, and from the higher standpoint to do the work that I have been too weak to do here."

Sister Brown was well known and loved by a large circle of friends. Her mother, brothers and sisters, with her husband and children, and many other friends are left to mourn their loss, but many rejoice at her hope and gain. Oh, that her mantle of love, faith, hope, and good works may fall upon those who are left.—J. H. Paton.
