Procure an ounce of saturated solution of permanganate of potash from your druggist. If when a drop of the solution is added to a tumbler of water, its color is changed to a brown, the water is not fit to drink; if it remains clear or slightly rose color, after an hour, it is, commonly speaking, safe. This is a simple way of testing your drinking water, and it would be a very good plan to do it.

Died, at the residence of his son, in the township of Kenosha, on Tuesday, November 24, 1891, James Mason, aged 64 years and 3 months. The funeral was held at the house at 10 a. m., Thursday, and the remains interred in Elmwood cemetery. Deceased was born in Scotland in 1827. He moved to London, Ont., where he resided for seven years. Four years were spent in Port Huron afterwards moving to Brockway where he had charge of the flour mill for five years. Finally he moved to the farm in Kenosha with his son where he resided until his death. He followed his trade, that of a miller, for 42 years. Deceased was comparatively a young man and his death was a surprise to his friends. He leaves a wife and one son besides numerous warm friends to mourn his departure.

Probably one of the largest real estate transfers in St. Clair county was recorded on January 20th, 1887. It consisted of the transfer of a piece of land containing 583 acres, now known as Butler's plat, and also a piece of land containing 626 acres, all on the north side of Black river, in the city of Port Huron. It was sold by John McNeil and wife, of Boston, to Simeon Cummings, of Batavia, N. Y., and the consideration was \$175,000. Simeon Cummings afterwards sold the 583 acres to Chas. Butler, an attorney of New York city, for \$125,000, and hence the name Butler's plat. The first deed recorded in St. Clair county, that there is at present any record of, was a patent from the United States government to Alex. Cummings, of Fort Gratiot, and was described as follows: The northeast and north-west quarters of section 23, town 4, range 16 north, containing 323 acres. There was no consideration named. The heading of the instrument bears the name of James Monroe, President of the United States. It was received for record by John Thorn, register, September 23, 1821, and can be found in book A, at the register of deed's office.—Port Huron Times.
