GOV. WINANS AGAINST THE ST. CLAIR COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

All those who heard the speech made by Gov. Winans last Tuesday will remember his unstinted praise of an act passed by the democratic legislature known as "The Mortgage Tax Law". He claimed that that was good for this law and gave great credit to the democratic legislature for passing it.

This seems strange talk in the face of the following resolution passed last week by the Board of Supervisors of St. Clair county, said Board being composed of nineteen republicans and twenty-three democrats, the resolution being passed with only two dissenting votes:

Resolved, That a certain law enacted by the last Michigan legislature, familiarly known as "the mortgage tax law," has been tested by the people of this county and has been universally condemned by all persons familiar with its workings (because of the fact among others that it relieves over \$1,000,000 of the most productive and valuable personal property within the county from all taxation and increases the burdens of the remainder of the property to the same extent); therefore,

Resolved, That we, the board of supervisors of St. Clair County, having at heart the best interests of our people and anxious that so plain a wrong should be speedily righted, hereby request of the members of the state legislature who shall be elected to represent this county in the next legislature, that at the earliest opportunity they introduce a bill repealing the said law and that they and each of them use the utmost of honorable endeavor to secure such repeal; and,

Resolved, That the clerk of this board send to each member-elect, as early as may be after election, a copy of this resolution. The only supervisors who voted against this resolution were John Terney of Kimball township and Chas. Bailey of Port Huron township.

GOV. WINANS AGAINST AUDITOR GENERAL STONE.

The testimony of the present Auditor General in reference to the same law is the same as that of the Board of Supervisors, and against the representatives of Gov. Winans. In his official report for the year 1891, Auditor General Stone says:

"The question is not alone, then, how far will the state suffer but how far will the people suffer? And who is responsible for the making of such laws, who, rather than protect the people, prevent crime and make dishonest officials honest, virtually put a premium upon dishonesty?"

In order to show that the Board of Supervisors and the democratic Auditor General are right, and Gov. Winans is wrong the following facts are given in reference to this law:

1. Bank stock is released from taxation. Every dollar of such stock in St. Clair and other counties in the state is relieved from paying any tax. In Port Huron alone the people are compelled to pay \$6,000 per year in taxes that was under republican rule assessed to banks. Yet in the face of this, the Democratic party hypocritically claims to be the friend of the people as against corporations.

2. In St. Clair Co. the personal property valuation has been reduced from \$2,683,192 in 1891 to \$1,625,556 in 1892, a decrease of \$457,636, while the reality assessment has been increased from \$14,728,808 in 1891, to \$15,210,900 in 1892 or increased \$482,192, thus shifting the burden of taxation from bank stockholders and the wealthy owners of personal property, to the owners of homes and farms, and making farmers who are endeavoring to pay for their farms and workmen who are laboring hard to pay for their homes pay the increased taxes while \$400,000 of bank stock yielding a dividend of ten percent, and \$600,000 of other productive personal property remains untaxed. Yet in the face of this the democratic party hypocritically claims to be a friend of the workingman and farmer as against corporations.

REPRESENTATIVE, ALBERT TOSCH.

Albert Tosch, the Republican candidate for representative in the state legislature for the third district of St. Clair county, is one of Mussey's prosperous young farmers. He was born in Canada and settled in the western part of St. Clair county, where he has since resided. He received a good English and German education, and has ever been a friend of our common schools. By his own exertions, hard work and good management he is the owner of a splendid farm of 120 acres, well stocked and provided with commodious buildings for his stock, and as good a dwelling for himself and family as can be found on any farm in the county.

Mr. Tosch is one of those energetic, well read, progressive, honest, upright and temperate young farmers, worthy of the confidence of all with whom he has any dealings, which was well illustrated by the voters of his town electing him highway commissioner, and supervisor for four terms. Such a vote is the best proof of the confidence of his neighbors. His experience on the board of supervisors has well qualified him for the position he seeks, and if elected, the third representative district of St. Clair county will be able to represent in the state legislature.

COUNTY TREASURER, GEO. W. CARMAN.

The Republican candidate for county treasurer, George W. Carman, was born in the city of New York in the year 1852. His family removed to Michigan in 1851, settling on a farm near Memphis. In his youth Mr. Carman attended school in Michigan, finishing his education at Danbury, Conn. Subsequently he read law for eighteen months in the states of New York and Michigan, but finding the study and practice of law not to his taste, he abandoned it, and was for four years in the United States Lake survey of the Great Lakes and the Mississippi River. This position he resigned in 1879 to accept the appointment of postmaster at Memphis, where he also carried on a banking business.

In 1884 Mr. Carman removed to Marine City and in connection with John W. Porter established the Marine Bank. After over seven years of successful business the Marine Bank was reorganized as the Marine Savings Bank, with a capital of \$50,000 and numbering among its stockholders the best business element of that city and vicinity. This bank has now a business of a quarter of a million of dollars on its books and is finely equipped with every facility for the transaction of business, including a substantial brick and stone building. Mr. Carman still remains its cashier, and has the confidence of the entire community as an honest and capable business man and financier. In his hands the moneys of the county will be entirely safe, and its financial affairs will be managed with care and integrity.

STATE SENATOR, ROBT. E. FRENCH.

Robert E. French, the Republican candidate for state senator, was born in England in 1834. At the age of eight years, with his father he came to Guelph, Ont. His father being in somewhat straightened circumstances, Robert was apprenticed to a farmer at the age of nine years, remaining on the farm until he had attained his 14th year, when he entered the employ of a shoemaker at Elora, Ont. He was obliged to remain in the store until nine o'clock in the evening, and for his knowledge caused him to study the greater portion of the night. He remained in Elora until 19 years of age. By practising the closest economy, he had by this time accumulated a few hundred dollars, and commenced manufacturing boots and shoes at Drayton, Ont. In 1861 he concluded to take up his residence in the United States, and with his family he removed to Fort Gratiot. He opened up a small shoe shop. By untiring effort and energy, giving every attention to business, he increased his business gradually from year to year, until in 1880 he was able to erect the fine double brick store, which he equipped with a large stock of dry goods, boots and shoes. About two years ago he decided to enjoy a well earned rest from business cares, and sold out to his son, George French, closing an active and honorable business career of 39 years. He has held nearly every office in the gift of the people of Fort Gratiot. He was the first mayor of the city and held the office of village treasurer, township treasurer, justice of the peace and postmaster before the incorporation of the city of Fort Gratiot. His official career has been faithful and honorable.

Efficient and scrupulous in the discharge of public trust, honorable to all men, a kind father, a loving husband, a true friend, R. E. French is one of the citizens of whom this senatorial district is justly and highly proud, a pioneer to whom all honor is due. If the people of the district again call him from private life, they will find him the same honest, conscientious and competent official.

JUDGE OF PROBATE, JOHN L. BLACK.

John L. Black, the Republican candidate for judge of probate, was born in Strathroy, Ont., in 1857. He attended the public schools and assisted his father at cabinet making until he arrived at the age of 21 years. In 1878 he concluded to take up his residence in the United States, and came to Port Huron, where he entered the office of O'Brien J. Atkinson and Elliott G. Stevenson. He was admitted to the bar in 1883. Mr. Black declared his intention of becoming a citizen soon after arriving in Port Huron. He was surrounded by democratic influences, but was a great reader. He wanted to identify himself with the political party which had the most push and progress. He studied the principles of the Republican party and read Democratic history. As a result his first vote was cast for the Republican ticket and he has been an enthusiastic Republican ever since. Mr. Black has held the office of justice of the peace, circuit court commissioner, and one term as judge of probate. He has filled every office well. Four years ago, upon taking possession of the probate office, he found that to properly serve the people the office should be kept open every day in the week and not one day only, as theretofore.
