**A TRAGEDY IN AN INSANE ASYLUM.** In the lunatic asylum at Watton West Virginia, on Friday night, the 7th inst. Blane Starry, one of the inmates, from Jefferson county, confined in room No. 6, managed during the night to climb over the partition, which does not reach to the ceiling, into an adjoining room, in which were confined two other inmates. He managed to kill one of them; John Rose, and nearly killed the other. Rose was brought to the institution from Pt. Pleasant, and was an inoffensive man.

**GERMAN CARP.**—There is to be soon a large distribution of this fine pond fish made by the United States Fish Commissioner, from the Government ponds in Washington. It is said that this fish will propagate and thrive in stagnant water, and that it is as firm of flesh and game as the black bass. Parties having ponds which they want to stock are advised to send to Col. M. McDonald, Virginia Fish Commissioner, Smithsonian Institute, Washington, D. C., who will send them circular forms of application, to be filled and forwarded. The fish will be delivered at the nearest railroad station free of charge; but applicants will be expected to meet them and take immediate possession of them on their arrival.
