The Trades Assembly passed a resolution extending an invitation to the different unions of Duluth to take part in the Debs parade and meeting in the opera house.

Rev. Carwardine addressed a large crowd at the city hall Wednesday evening on Industrial Problems. The lecture was under the auspices of the Trades Assembly.

The Debs' demonstration was the largest ever seen in this city. Fully 10,000 people listened to the great champion of human right at the Fair building and at the Treadwell hall where the overflow waited for fully three hours to see and hear their leader. A more earnest, thoughtful and enthusiastic crowd never congregated in Superior.

**Denham Thompson's "Old Homestead."**
