YERGEN WALKS OUT

DRAYMEN'S DELEGATE LEAVES THE TRADES ASSEMBLY.

Mr. Kriz Calls Attention to a Clause in the Union's Constitution That He Claims Admits Only Licensed Busses Are Eligible and the Assembly Decides That the Clause Must be Altered.

The Duluth Federal Trades assembly held its regular bi-weekly meeting at its hall last evening and transacted some business of importance to the union world. The greatest question of the evening was the question of the constitution of the draymen's union.

The question arose on the report of Delegate Kriz as to a provision in the constitution. He did not like the section saying that only licensed draymen should belong to the union for he was of the opinion that this meant that only busses could belong. The discussion was lengthy and it was the opinion of the delegates that there should be a union of teamsters so that the drivers of the drays might belong. Delegate Yergen, of the draymen, did not like this and he said that the draymen would run their business without any union. He then left the hall. After the delegate had left, the assembly voted to instruct him to report back to his union that different clause in regard to the membership would have to be inserted in the constitution or the assembly would not recognize the delegates.

Delegate Baker reported that the organization of the brewery workers of the city was affecting. He said that the demand from the West Superior brewery workers for a boycott on some of the breweries of the city had been withdrawn and the organization of the men here would be completed tomorrow.

The newly elected officers of the assembly were installed at the meeting last night. The new officers are as follows: President, John McMurry; vice president, Gordon O'Neil; recording secretary, A. A. Fider, reading clerk, H. Dworschak; treasurer, J. W. Richardson, trustees, August Searles, John Meyers, W. Thompson; sergeant-at-arms, James Dunn.

The following new delegates were admitted and obligated: Cigarmakers, Ed Schwisky, J. Pastowski, Wise Miller; Duluth Typographical union, H. Dworschak, H. B. Mitchell; Tailors' union, E. Walgren.

George Jensen addressed the assembly in behalf of the union men of Denmark, who are now locked out. Forty thousand of these men are affected by the lockout and Mr. Jensen asked that the delegates report to their unions and ask for aid. The secretary was instructed to communicate with the unions and ask aid for the Danes.

The Ladies of the Maccabees invited the members of the assembly and all union men to attend a picnic at Lester park next Thursday. The invitation was accepted.

The president was instructed to appoint a committee to arrange for the Labor Day celebration.

The assembly adjourned.

Agreed on a Scale.

CHICAGO, July 13.—The officers of the American Tin Plate Company and the wage committee of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, who have been in daily conference for the past two weeks over the question of wages of the tin workers employed by the American Tin Plate Company, agreed on a scale today.

The scale, which was signed by the tin plate officials and the Amalgamated association's committee, grants a straight increase of 15 per cent. The increase takes effect July 15. The wage list as adopted is to be the minimum scale for the year ending June 30, 1900. Over 30,000 tin plate workers are benefited by the increase.

ATTEMPTED REBELLION.

As Result Aguilar and Sixty Men Are In Jail.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—The Evening Post is authority for the statement that a cablegram was received here today stating that the first attempt at rebellion at Guatemala against the administration of President Cabrera had been made and had failed.

A cipher dispatch sent to a gentleman in this city stated that the uprising occurred in Quetzaltenango.

The government, however, was advised in time to suppress that movement, and as a result Felidno Aguilar and sixty men were arrested and are now in jail.

TO LAND TODAY.

Oregon Volunteers Will Be Escorted To Camp.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—It has almost been definitely determined to land the Oregon volunteers tomorrow morning. The Newport and Ohio, with the Oregon boys on board, will be docked tomorrow. General Shafter has arranged to have a suitable escort from the Presidio to march with the returned soldiers in a parade tomorrow and later to escort them to the camp at the Presidio.

The mustering out process will take two or three weeks. Governor Green of Oregon and his staff will leave for Portland tomorrow afternoon after the parade.

Outing of Red Men.

The order of Red Men of this city plans to give a picnic at Oat-ka beach during the session of the grand council of Red Men that will be held at West Superior.

North Land Six Hours Late.

Owing to the misunderstanding of a telephone message it was announced yesterday that the North Land would probably be on time last night. As a matter of fact the big boat was almost six hours late in passing the Soo and she will reach Duluth at an early hour this morning.

Will Bring 10,000 People.

An excursion to Duluth from Mason City, Ia., and intermediate points, has been arranged for July 25 and 26 over the St. Paul & Duluth and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul roads. The railroad expect to bring 10,000 people to Duluth that week.

STARTLING LIST OF KILLED AND WOUNDED IN MANILA.

Montana Regiment Suffers Death Loss of Thirty-Two and Hundred and Three Wounded.

Special Telegram.

According to a private cablegram received in this city, the first Montana volunteer regiment has returned to Manila from the firing line at San Fernando to prepare for embarkation. Adjutant General English has prepared from official dispatches a complete list of the casualties of this regiment, which are quite startling for one year's service, embracing as it does 32 deaths, 103 wounded in action and two demented and sent to Washington for treatment at the hands of eminent physicians, who give every promise of being able to cure them.
