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LOW DUES MEANS CHEAP RESULTS IN UNIONISM

Most Successful Trade Unions Have Adopted the High Rate.

No Disposition on Part of These Unions to Return to Low Rate.

The question of whether the members of the trades union should pay high dues or low dues may continue a resting topic for academic discussion and serve as fuel to keep aglow the fading flame of the non-progressive unionist.

It is a fact patent to all unions operating under the higher dues system that the higher rate of dues is a easily collected as the lower rate.

High dues is the logical system of trades union revenue. Not only is it the policy of the more successful trades unions, but it is gradually being adopted by those unions whose progress has been retarded by insufficient revenue.

With the form of organization that accompanies a low dues system the execution of a progressive national policy is next to impossible.

At every step they are confronted with a lack of funds, and plans and work ordered, must be given up.

It is a fact that every national union adopting the high dues system has not returned or seriously contemplated returning to low dues, and the tendency is higher instead of lower dues.

BILLY THE KID AND HIS FINISH

True Story of His Talk With Lew Wallace—Pat Garrett's Sudden Nerve.

From the Washington Star:

"I recently had a look at the room in the old palace in Santa Fe in which Gen. Lew Wallace, while governor of the territory of New Mexico, wrote a large part of 'Ben Hur'."

"To a good many folks in Santa Fe, however, that room in the old palace has an element of interest entirely separate from its having been the birthplace of the 'Ben Hur' book."

"The general took the kid if he'd promise to behave and lead a decent life from then on, he, the governor of the territory, would see to it that he wasn't molested."

"I just point my finger at what I shoot at, that's all," he said to the general, and illustrated his way of pointing, using a pistol to do it.

"He simply permitted his forefinger to rest along the barrel of his pistol, and then, instead of attempting to point, he held it as if he were holding his forefinger at the target pulling the trigger with his middle finger."

"From a talk which I had on this same trip with one of the most prominent citizens of Roswell, New Mexico, I learned that a popular story, which is told to Billy the Kid, was that he was wrong in most of its details."

"It was recalled that Billy the Kid made a sudden getaway from the Lincoln county jail in Lincoln, where he was under sentence of death. Pat Garrett was the sheriff of Lincoln county at that time."

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From the Washington Star:

"The kid was at the top of those steps in three jumps, and he put his shoulder to the locked door and broke the door open before the deputy sheriff knew what was coming off."

"The kid got his hands on a pair of loaded guns and was back at the door in time to find the deputy sheriff hopping up the steps, gun out. The kid got the deputy sheriff through the heart with the first shot. Then he stood at the top of the steps, waiting."

"The deputy sheriff who was across the street at the restaurant with the other men, saw the kid running over. He had just poked his head out of the back door of the jail, on his way to the yard to investigate the cause of the shot, when the kid, from his position at the top of the steps of the second-story building, got him through the brain."

"Then the kid was in the possession of Billy the Kid, its only guardians during the absence of Sheriff Pat Garrett had the two deputies whom he had put away."

"Going to the front door of the jail, the kid put the first man he saw on the street under the gun and commanded him to enter the jail and flee with the iron bars and lead the man obeyed, and in a few minutes the kid was unshackled."

"The town in the meantime had found out what was going on at the jail, but the citizens were terrified. Not a move was made to swoop on the evil young fellow who held the jail. He remained in possession of the jail for more than an hour before he got what he was waiting for—a horse."

"The man who had just ridden into town on a fine horse passed by the jail. The kid, standing in the door of the jail, put the man under the gun, directing the horse's owner to mosey down the street and out of town. When Billy mounted the horse the first time the spirited brute, rebelling against his new rider, bucked and threw him. The kid, having been a cattle puncher most of his days, was as well horseman, and they say down there that was the last time he had ever been bucked off a horse."

"But he got on again, and although the horse tried to toss him once more, the kid knew how to get him down to business and he galloped out of Lincoln, heeled with two good and a couple of belts stuffed with ammunition."

"Sheriff Pat Garrett didn't get back to Lincoln until the next day. He didn't say much, not being a loquacious man, but he oiled up his guns and looked at them a lot on his mind. As soon as he found out what had happened at the jail during his absence he sent a sudden rider to Roswell, sixty miles away, for John W. Poe, the man who is now the town president at Roswell. Poe had done some successful badman hunting with Garrett before, and Garrett wanted Poe along with him on the hunt he was about to undertake for Billy the Kid."
