TOBACCO TRUST GETS BAD MEN ON ITS TRAIL

United States Government Unearths Evidence of Most Damaging Nature.

Tables Are Quickly Being Turned on Monster Monopoly of the Weed.

New York, June 1.—The poor old Tobacco Trust is now getting a little of the medicine it has been doling out to the retail trade whenever it had an opportunity.

"Special agents of the attorney general are now in Philadelphia getting evidence against the tobacco trust. Already a mass of evidence has been secured and is now being investigated.

"Trust methods of dealing with tobacco jobbers and dealers are being brought to light through the inquiry which is being conducted in this city by Federal authorities.

"The government agents have so far visited a score more of prominent tobaccoists. Despite the fact that the trust practically controls all of the local dealers, these men are strong in their denunciation of the trust and eager to be freed from the trust's despotism."

Purchasers of tobacco should help the good work along by refusing to use any goods bearing the name of the Tobacco Trust, be it cigars, tobacco or cigarettes.

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FEW CHILDREN ARE AT WORK

Labor Commissioner Williams Says Duluth Holds Record In This Respect.

Less child labor is employed in Duluth than in any of the larger cities of Minnesota, according to a statement issued by W. H. Williams, state labor commissioner.

Mr. Williams is at work compiling the returns from Supt. R. E. Denfeld, showing the number of children under 16 years of age that are employed during school seasons, and he reports that several brothers and sisters, a few were about 150 children under 16 years of age employed, but only one or two were employed in violation of the law.
