**McEWEN TALKS AT SUPERIOR**

**Duluth Man Urges Workingmen to Organize for Their Own Protection.**

The meeting of the Trades and Labor assembly held last night at Union hall was well attended and the proceedings were of more than usual interest. The principal feature was an address by William McEwen of the Duluth Labor World, who spoke on the necessity of more thoroughly organizing the unions and stirring up the members to their duties as labor men. A brief report of the same lines was also made by Henry Perault, of Duluth.

Following the speeches nominations were in order for the annual election and after a time the result was announced. The following were put up for the offices named to be voted upon at the regular meeting July 25: For president H. C. Stivers; for vice president, W. J. Patterson; financial secretary, H. A. Cross; recording secretary, John Josephson; treasurer, John Isaacson; sergeant at arms, John Dauphne; corresponding secretary, T. W. Kieley and H. C. Stivers.

Mr. Perault in his speech emphasized the necessity of living up to the obligations of a union man, and strengthening the membership wherever possible. His speech was well received. Mr. McEwen said in part:

"After all is said and done there is but an imaginary boundary line between Minnesota and Wisconsin. The interests of the workingmen are the same in both states. We have witnessed a remarkable change in sentiment during the last few months. The Parryites have made a desperate attempt to destroy the movement, but they were buried in their own infancy."

"The opportune exposures of Lawson have demonstrated the necessity of the organization of labor. Parryism was weakened from the moment Lawson fired his heavy shots into the frontiers of the country, and every effort made to revive the movement antagonistic to labor has been as the dying gasps of a lost cause."

"There never was a time in the history of the labor movement when the workingmen enjoyed the full fruits of organization as they do today. There never was a time when the necessity for organization was so great. I can only implore the workingmen of Superior to pursue the work of organization with vigor so that they can best cope with the opposition that presents itself from time to time."

Mr. McEwen referred to the struggles of the workingmen in Russia for political liberty and dwelt at length on the struggle there. He insisted that while they were still struggling for political liberties our duty was to work for great industrial independence.

**FALSE ARREST TRAPS DOUBLE-LIFE MAN**

PITTSBURG, July 11.—The arrest last night of William McVeigh Smith and Clara Gerner, on complaint of Smith's wife, who lives in Turtle Creek, revealed the fact that Smith, a wealthy contractor, has for some time past been living a double life. He was known in Turtle Creek by his correct name and at No. 39 Tunnel street, where he was arrested, as William McVeigh. He might still be practicing the deception if not been for a peculiar turn of events.

Some weeks ago the Gerner woman, who is known in the neighborhood as Mrs. McVeigh, was arrested on the street. At the hearing the next day it was clearly proven that the two officers who made the arrest had overstepped their authority, and there was a great hue and cry raised about respectable women being arrested without cause. The policemen were dragged before the trial board and threatened with dismissal. Mrs. Smith happened to see the story in the papers. She became suspicious and questioned her husband. He could not answer satisfactorily. Then she sought the policemen who arrested McVeigh. She was not long in discovering that her husband was leading a double life.

**HAND ORGAN MUSIC STIRS EAST ORANGE**

EAST ORANGE, July 11.—G. E. Mills, of No. 16 Maple avenue south, has embarked upon a crusade against hand organs. He called upon Mayor William Kardwilt at his office and demanded the mayor that he wanted the hurdy gurdy manipulators either exterminated or regulated.

Mr. Mills has been prompted in his action by a recent experience. In the same block in which he lives a woman lives who is critically ill. An organ grinder came along a day or two ago, and, starting to play, was asked to move away because of the invalid. The man refused to move, demanded money and became quite abusive, and when Mr. Mills strove out of his place hinted that he had a knife and might use it on little provocation, and the organ played on.

Mayor Kardwilt has been besieged by people who want the hand organ nuisance abated, and the mayor said today that he intended to take steps through the city council to have the trouble done away with or regulated in some manner.

**BIG LAND SALE**

MARQUETTE, Mich., July 11.—A warranty deed by which the Detroit, Mackinac & Marquette Railway company, W. G. Mather, of Cleveland and the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company transfer 59,904 acres of land to the Upper Peninsula Land company, was filed here today. The tract is located in Marquette county and is well timbered. The consideration was \$74,925.

**NEW CHIEF ENGINEER FOR PANAMA.**



Announcement was made at Washington of the appointment of John F. Stevens, chief engineer of the Chicago division of the Great Northern railway, to succeed Mr. J. F. Wallace as chief engineer of the Panama canal. It is now stated positively that Mr. Wallace has been making arrangements to assume the direction of the engineering affairs of the Thomas F. Ryan traction syndicate. It is known that the turn affairs have taken since his resignation from the canal commission and the strictures placed on him by Secretary Taft have seriously embarrassed those who are at the head of the syndicate.

**MATRIMONIAL AD MAY LEAD TO JAIL**

CHAMBERSBURG, Pa., July 11.—Unable to furnish bail in the sum of \$1,000, W. H. Woody, who claims to be a United States detective, is in the Franklin county prison charged with a crime that will send him to the penitentiary if convicted. For five years Woody has been a fireman on the Cumberland Valley railroad. On Saturday afternoon he was arrested by Constable William M. Letter on warrants charging him with criminal assault and battery.

The police say they have evidence that will prove he inserted an advertisement in a local newspaper for a wife, holding out the inducement that he was heir to a large sum of money and that in order to get his inheritance was obliged to marry. In this way, it is charged, he gained admission to the homes of several young women, and that at the point of a revolver he tried to assault one of them. Woody is 30 years old. For a number of weeks he has been watched by the authorities, who suspected him of using the office of a government detective to become acquainted with young women.

**BIG FREIGHT YARDS WILL BE BUILT**

SAN FRANCISCO, July 11.—It has been formally announced by local officials of the Santa Fe company that steps are to be immediately taken toward establishing big freight yards on the China basin property. As a result of the recent visit to this city of Vice President Kendrick, instructions have been issued by General Manager Wells to Chief Engineer Burns to hurry to complete the plans for the construction of two immense freight houses in that locality. They will be the nucleus for what promises to be one of the largest freight terminals in the west. It is expected that the construction of these buildings will take about a year, during which time other important improvements will be underway at the basin.

In discussing the subject one of the officials of the road said: "That San Francisco is to be a great freight center is no longer a theory, but a certainty. Competitive points along the coast will not materially interfere with this city's growth in this respect. The Santa Fe company is now preparing to meet this development at a present cost of \$10,000,000."

**HAY FOOT, STRAW FOOT MARCH TO PRISON**

ORANGE, July 11.—Constable James Smith, of Phillipsburg, went to Alpha on Thursday night to arrest a foreigner on a trivial charge, and was set upon, beaten and disarmed. Not discouraged, he returned to Phillipsburg, and, obtaining the assistance of four deputies, returned to Alpha and arrested seventeen persons, including one woman, whom he charged with the service of the warrant. The constables tied the prisoners together with a long rope, chain gang fashion, and marched them to the lock-up in Phillipsburg.

**NEWS OF MUTINY SPREAD BY JAPS**

SIPINGHAI, Manchuria, July 11.—The news of the mutiny in the Black Sea reached the Russian army through the Japanese, who fired night shells charged with proclamations conveying the information into the Russian advanced posts. Rain is falling in torrents, and all activity at the front has ceased.

**LAWYER AND SCRIBE FIGHT WITH SWORDS**

PANAMA, July 11.—A duel with swords was fought this afternoon by Eusebio Morales, a prominent attorney, formerly fiscal agent of the United States at Panama, and Julio Arjona, a well known newspaper man and conservative politician. The trouble arose over the publication of an article by Arjona. Arjona was slightly wounded.

**CATHOLIC CHURCH BURNED.**  
MORRIS, Minn., July 11.—The large Catholic church of Morris was destroyed by fire today. Loss is about \$11,000, partially covered by insurance.

**GRAFT AMERICA'S BESETTING SIN**

**Gov. Folk Says It Is so Prevalent as to Be Almost Conventional.**

FREEMONT, Neb., July 11.—"The decay of a state is its failure to enforce its laws," declared Governor Folk of Missouri, in his address before the Free-moon Chautauqua assembly this evening. "There is nothing to a state but its law. Its cities, its lands and its wealth do not constitute it. Its prosperity depends upon its rigid carrying out of the laws it makes."

Governor Folk's topic was "Boodle and Bootleggers," and his address was largely upon his experiences in enforcing the laws in Missouri. He declared graft as so prevalent that it has become conventional. Men who believed themselves honest fall into the way.

"If this country lives 300 years yet it will be the youngest republic," said Governor Folk. "Its greatest evil is graft. Graft has a general prevalence. It has little prosecution. Before the prosecution of grafters began in St. Louis, there had been only two or three such prosecutions in the history of the country. In St. Louis the house of delegates for fourteen years passed not a single favored vote for which a price was not paid. The value of votes was fixed."

**ST. PAUL IS AFTER NEW AUDITORIUM**

ST. PAUL, July 11.—At a mass meeting held tonight in the council chambers \$50,000 was subscribed toward a fund for building a new auditorium in this city. The city had already appropriated \$150,000. Three hundred thousand dollars is the amount prescribed by those who are advancing the project. From the spirit exhibited at the meeting tonight the rest of the sum will be raised within a short time.

**ST. PAUL RESIDENTS TO BE RECOUNTED**

ST. PAUL, July 11.—The local census bureau has been granted an extension of time in which to make its final report to the state bureau. This may carry the work of enumeration on to the last day of the month.

The time granted is to be used in a practical re-checking of the city, which, Supervisor Warner thinks, will result in adding many names to the already increased list.

Estimates made now show conclusively that the 1905 census will give St. Paul approximately 190,000 population.

**FATAL COLLISION IN NEW YORK HARBOR**

NEW YORK, July 11.—One man was fatally hurt and six others had a narrow escape from drowning today, when the tug Onida ran down the forty-foot naphtha launch Edna, owned by Nicholas Smith, in the upper bay off Twenty-sixth street, Brooklyn. Mr. Smith, owner of the launch, was one of those on board at the time of the collision. He escaped injury. The launch was cut in two and sank. Otto Lindberg, one of the crew, was crushed in the collision and is dying. The others were rescued by the crew of the tug boat.

**CHAS. M. SCHWAB GET BIG JOB**

NEW YORK, July 11.—A St. Petersburg dispatch to the World says: The navy department having resolved to build a powerful new navy has instructed Charles M. Schwab to make plans for new wharves, giving the exact time in which the work can be completed.

**THIRTY-NINE MINERS FERAL.**  
DORTHMUND, Frisia, July 11.—Efforts to rescue the thirty-nine men who were cut off by the fire in the Borussia coal mine yesterday have been without success, and it is feared they have perished.
