### AGGIE MYERS SAYS SHE IS INNOCENT

LIBERTY, Mo., June 20.—Mrs. Aggie Myers convicted of killing her husband Clarence Myers, and who Governor Folk has promised to grant a respite, talked in her cell here last night of her case. She had regained her composure following the announcement that the state supreme court had denied her a new trial. "I am truly thankful," said Mrs. Myers, "to the governor for giving me addi-

tional time in which to take the few legal measures remaining. If every legal measure falls and the good women of Missouri and the newspapers who are endeavoring to secure a commutation of my sentence are unsuccessful, then I will mount the scaffold and pay the penalty of the people's prejudice without fear of the future, for I am innocent of killing my husband, Clarence Myers and Hottman knows it. He should tell the truth and prepare to meet his God with clean lips."

### WALTER JOHNSON GETS GOOD POLITICAL JOB

Governor Johnson Determines Upon Labor Man for Deputy Game Warden.

Appointee is Well Known in Duluth — General Satisfaction Expressed Over Choice.

Governor Johnson made good this week. In looking about for a suitable person to occupy the position of deputy game and fish warden for the Duluth district, he decided upon Walter Johnson, one of the best known union men in Minnesota.

The appointment was as much of a surprise to Walter, as it was to his host of friends who are ever interested in his welfare, for it was thought that the present incumbent, Mr. Green, would be permitted to hold over.

Walter Johnson is a Duluth boy, having lived in the city all of his life. He has always been a consistent member of his political party, and a union man of the first water.

General satisfaction is expressed by all Democrats over the appointment, and this week Governor Johnson is the recipient of many compliments from Duluth Democrats who heretofore have been rather lukewarm towards the governor.

Union labor men also feel jubilant over the recognition accorded by Walter's appointment. We do not know of one dissatisfied person, and this is saying a good deal.

He will probably take office July 1st.

### TWO MEN PERISH IN PENNSYLVANIA TUNNEL

Fatal Accident is Caused by Tremendous Air Pressure.

NEW YORK, June 20.—Two men lost their lives, another was fatally injured and six more were severely hurt as a result of an accident in the Pennsylvania tunnel between 34th street this city and Long Island City today. Twenty-four of the 35 men, who were at work in the tunnel at the time of the accident, escaped without serious injury after having faced death by drowning.

The accident was caused by the tremendous air pressure necessary at the head of the tunnel to hold back the soft mud into which the shield is forced. The mud under this shield was blown out and two of the workmen, who were caught in the flow of air were swept to death in the river. When the heading was emptied of air, water rushed in through the opening and threatened to drown the survivors. In the struggle which followed between the workmen to escape from the chamber through the little door which connects with the finished part of the tunnel, several of them were severely hurt. Finally, however, the cooler heads among the men prevailed and all of the survivors either by their own efforts or the assistance of others found safety in the completed tunnel. So rapidly did the water flow into the unfinished compartment that before the last man's turn came to pass through the little door he was standing neck deep in the water.

### INDIAN IS ACCUSED OF KILLING TWO

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 20.—Alexander McIntosh, a half-breed and Max Neclar, a guide from the Kamloops, were shot and killed yesterday at Hazelton. Simon Johnson, an Indian of the Kipscrex tribe, is accused of the crime. Leclair's horse is missing and it is supposed the Indian killed the guide in order to get the animal.

### ICE DEALERS ACQUITTED.

CLEVELAND, June 20.—The jury tonight brought in a verdict of not guilty in the cases of the local ice dealers indicted for alleged violation of the Valentine anti-trust law and charged with conspiring to fix the price and control the manufacture and sale of ice. The trial has been in progress for ten days.

### JEWS FALSELY ACCUSED.

LONDON, June 20.—The Jewish Chronicle of this city says it has received a telegram from Bialystok announcing that the murderer of Chief of Police Doratschek, who was shot and killed here May 30 was a former policeman. The Jews had previously been accused of the crime.

## A Bad Case of Secret Rebates in Duluth.

Among the accounts on our Petty Ledger, which we purchased from Mr. Burrows a year ago, is one against a local plumbing firm for nearly a hundred dollars. This firm refuses to settle, claiming that the amount was due them for rebates on orders for merchandise with which they sent their workmen to the Burrows store. He claims that he had discontinued giving rebates before these orders were filled by him. The plumber, however, says, that he never received notice to this effect and that in at least one case an employe had found out about the system and had insisted on getting the benefit of the 10 per cent rebate for himself. Furthermore, we were told that they would be pleased to continue sending us orders if we were willing to grant the rebate.
