STRIKE BREAKER IS A VERITABLE JUDAS

Prof. Eliot's "Modern Heroes" Roundly Scored by Popular Congregational Minister.

Says If Strike Breaker Is a Hero Then Judas Ought to Be Lauded.

It is not often that the rights of labor find an exponent and defender in the pulpit and for that reason the following extracts taken from a sermon recently preached by Rev. Alan Hudson, of the First Congregational church, Brocton, Mass., is a remarkable dissertation which cannot fail to be an inspiration to every true and honest union man when he feels the duties of his unionism are becoming a strain upon the resources and a menace to his necessities and any one of the paragraphs quoted is a wholesome sermon in itself:

"Human rights are not so much a matter of law as they are of nature. They are God given. It is for this reason that a strike is justifiable. When rights cannot be secured by reason and arbitration, then the strike is a righteous necessity. It has recently been stated by an eminent publicist that a strike is morally wrong. When greed and monopoly refuse to recognize the simple rights of the worker, then the strike is not only necessary, but it is the poor man's God given right. Will any man say that the strikes that redeemed children from a 15-hour day in the factories were wrong? Will he say that the strikes that have transformed the lives of mill-women from slaves to that of human beings were wrong? Strikes have brought about temporary distress, but they have done much to better the condition of the toiler. They have made the factories healthier, they have transformed the worker from a serf to a man, they have made it possible for a child to study instead of slave."

"We were told a few months ago by an eminent educator that the strike breaker is a hero. I believe, on the other hand, that the man who has no sympathy for the needs and rights of others and cares only for himself and betrays their cause is not a hero, but a traitor. He well deserves the expressive name 'scab'."

"Why has the world for nineteen hundred years execrated the name of Judas? Because he had no sympathy because like the strike breaker, he betrayed his friend. Why has Benedict Arnold gone down into American history covered with dishonor? Because in the hour of his country's need he betrayed her cause and thought only of his own selfish interest."

"In the face of these facts we are told that the man who betrays the cause of his industrial fellow men is a hero; if so, then Judas was a hero and Jesus was wrong in calling him

a son of perdition. If so, Benedict Arnold was a hero and Americans should build a monument to his memory. Yes, you have the right to be a strike breaker, but if you follow man is seeking justice to better his condition—seeking to increase his humble wage—to clothe, educate and make a little home for his children, he is a mean, small selfish traitor who would betray his cause. He is fit to lock hands with Benedict Arnold and Judas Iscariot.

"We should also manifest our sympathy for the old worker. In these days the faithful old mechanic, who has given his life to his trade, is rewarded by neglect and indifference. If he cannot earn as much as formerly, give him what he can earn and do not treat him as an incubation. Let the young man who expects some day to be old have a heart of sympathy for the old worker, not endeavor to supplant him, but to maintain his position."


ONCE WORTHLESS TAMARACK IS CUT

SOME STRAY SHOTS FROM A PREACHER

Chas. Stelzle Says Preacher Who Trims the Truth Does Not Last.

Some Points on Relation of the Workingman to the Church of Christ.

I have observed that the preacher who trims the truth does not long hold the respect of his congregation, whether they be rich or poor. Sometimes a man of small caliber will attempt to fire a shot which is too big for him, and the recoil knocks him down. His views are not well balanced. He is weak in his general makeup. And he goes down, not because he has fired the big shot—for others have done it and brought down the enemy—but because he could not make good for his general proposition. He will then declare that he is down and out because he dared to tell the truth, when really he is out because he could not tell enough truth.

A western labor commissioner recently declared that Christ's admonition to the rich young ruler to "sell all that thou hast, give it to the poor, and follow me," applies to every person who would become a true follower of "the meek and lowly Jesus." "To come in the right spirit you must come poor in person" he further insists. He then adds that were a preacher to advocate this doctrine he would lose his pulpit in less than a month.

Probably laboring men would be among the first to declare such a preacher an unbalanced fanatic. But did not Christ teach this doctrine to the Church? No; he taught it to a single individual whose wealth stood in the way of his following the Master. It was not a general command to be observed by every would-be Christian. The communism which existed for a brief period in the early Church was purely a voluntary arrangement. It did not apply to all Christians, nor to any of them all the time. There really is such a thing as a communism of sense in the Church, and among workingmen, too.

It is raising an old question to ask if the workingman will be welcome in the Church. Professor Wycoff of Princeton University, who some years ago trumpeted it as a workingman, tells us that he was almost invariably given a hearty reception in the churches which he attended. During the Minneapolis convention of the American Federation of Labor, I preached in what is supposed to be the wealthiest church in that city. Scattered throughout the audience, and occupying some of the best seats, I recognized quite a few delegates who were attending the convention, besides others who greeted me after the services.

LICORICE PASTE CASE JURY IS SELECTED

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—The jury which will try the MacAndrews & Forbes company, the J. S. Young company and Howard Young, the presidents of the companies, charged with having "combined and conspired" to violate the Sherman act in monopolizing the licorice paste industry of the country, was completed today. Henry W. Taft, special assistant United States attorney general, began the opening argument for the government. He declared that Jungbluth was the master mind in the formation of an illegal combination to control the licorice paste trade. Mr. Taft emphasized that no independent manufacturer or dealer is prosecuting the defendants. He said that the United States government is the complainant in fact as well as in name. The taking of evidence will begin tomorrow.

WITHDRAWAL WITHOUT AUTHORITY OF LAW

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—Admitting that they had no authority of law for the withdrawal from allotment of nearly 4,000,000 acres of lands belong-

ing to the Five Civilized Tribes in the Indian territory for the purpose of creating a forest reservation, two members of the president's cabinet—Secretary Hitchcock, of the department of the interior, and Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture, endeavored today to justify their course by stating that they had the best interest of the Indians at heart. The explanation was made before a select senate committee, which is investigating affairs in relation to the property rights of the five tribes, but the committee declined to accept it and Senators Clark of Wyoming, Taylor, Long and Brandagee declared that the interior department had suspended a statute of the United States without authority and that it was the duty of Secretary Hitchcock to immediately cancel his order withdrawing the land from allotment.

ENGLISH PRINCE HAS NO DESIGNS ON THRONE

LONDON, Dec. 19.—In connection with the recent rumor of a plot to place Prince Arthur of Connaught on the Serbian throne, M. Mijatovitch, ex-Serbian minister in London, in a published interview, admits that twice within a year delegates from Belgrade have vainly endeavored to interest him in the proposal, asserting that King Peter would be induced to abdicate peacefully in favor of an English prince. M. Mijatovitch said he declined to have anything to do with such a fantastic suggestion but declares there is a definite political party in Serbia favoring a change in the dynasty.
