MAIL ORDER MENACE.

ing the retail merchants of the country to-day and the one this is giving them the most concern is that of the co-called mail-order system-the retail catalog house trade.

This is an era of combinationstrusts, both financial, industrial, and commercial. But the most menacing trust in the wrold today is the commercial combination that tends to destroy the retail business of the country by diverting the trade from its natural channels to the great money

Not satisfied with the mercantile fields, these commercial trusts are also seeking to become the financial depositaries for the rural districts by opening bank departments, and as an inducement offering six per cent on

If the retail trade is to hold its ground against the competition of the catalog houses, they must meet them on the broad field of advertising and publicity, as well as on the field of prices. And this must be done through the local press.

Some of the local merchants have advertised liberally in the local press. but a much larger number have ut terly failed to keep up with the procession. The people often do not know what the local merchant has in his store-neither do they know the prices, but they do know what the catalog house has to sell, and the price is always before the eye.

The Retail Merchants' Association of Newcastle, Ind., has placed the ban on all advertising schemes, and will have nothing to do with programs, so-called business directories, and other devices devised to separate a merchant from his cash. Newspaper advertising is recognized as the only profitable publicity method, and will be strictly adhered to in the future. If all the country merchants will use space in their local papers a little more freely and change their ads often, if they can quote prices, describe goods in stock or to arrive at a certain date, they will soon find themselves profiting by it-in welcoming trade now going to the large mail-order houses of Chicago-which they have secured wholly by advertisAs labor becomes more intelligent protector of southern rights.
