There is one thing above another that stands out among the fellows that I know. AUSTRALIA NOW SOLID FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Victoria is the last of the Australian states to give women the right to vote for members of the State Parliament. Fourteen times the woman suffrage bill was thrown out by the legislative council after it had been passed by the lower house. Each time the hostile majority steadily diminished, and the women kept up their courage.

At the meeting of the house the bill went through by a majority of more than 4 to 1, the opposition breaking like the giving way of a dam.

For years the women in other states of Australia have stood on the same footing with the men. The gaining of the ballot by the women of Victoria has been the cause of great rejoicing among the suffragists both in England and America. They point to it as a proof that had the predicted disasters befallen the other Australian states the ballot would have been given to the women of Victoria even at this late date.

WORKER'S WIFE PLEADS FOR THE UNION LABEL

I wish I could persuade and enthrone more union women folks to notice labels, trade-marks, etc., on the goods they buy, says a woman writer to the Labor World.

If any of the articles purchased come from near-by factories, shops or canneries, find out about the conditions, personally, if you can. Are they union made? Do the makers work children? Is the work done in a cleanly, sanitary way? These are questions which command the immediate interest of the wives of union men and on which they should be thoroughly informed.

For instance, my grocer sent me a very nice lot of canned tomatoes. The label told me that the plant in this county, quite near our town, and it was a great pleasure to find, upon inquiry, that although the company were struggling beginners in the field, they are giving us good goods and their employees are well satisfied. "The boss is square," they report. I will use the product of this firm and boost them all I can, because they are "square."

On the other hand, I have been buying paper patterns of a firm, who, I understand, are unfair to the people they employ. I shall look out for their trademark and they will get no more of my money.

It is really a fascinating study to find out about these things, and think of the good we can do. We are the force behind "the man behind the gun." We distribute a good share of the money he earns, so let us see that it goes to build up concerns who are fair in their dealings and whose aim is to elevate their employees.
