### CHARGE WADE ELLIS PERSECUTED FARMERS FOR PRIVATE ENDS

WASHINGTON, May 20.—In protest against the recent conviction by a Kentucky federal jury of alleged night riders for violation of the Sherman anti-trust law, Representative Cantrill, of Kentucky, in the house this week charged Wade H. Ellis, and the department of justice with malicious persecution. He also charged that politics in Cincinnati was the basis of the department of justice's campaign against the members of the Burley Tobacco and Insurance society.

Cantrill read from various Ohio valley newspapers articles which related the friendship between Ellis and B. O. Eshelby, a Cincinnati Republican leader, and head of an independent tobacco manufacturing firm which brought suit against the Burley society for alleged conspiracy in restraint of trade.

Certificate of Incorporation OF THE WEST DULUTH AND DULUTH TRANSFER COMPANY.

We, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a corporation under and pursuant to the provision of Chapter Eighty-eight (88), Revised Laws of Minnesota for 1905, and any amendments thereof, do hereby associate ourselves as a body corporate, and do hereby adopt the following Certificate of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I. The name of the corporation shall be West Duluth and Duluth Transfer Company. The general nature of its business shall be to receive, store, warehouse and deliver goods, wares and merchandise of every class and description, and enter into contracts for the transportation of merchandise and passengers in and between said states. Also to purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, manufacture, equip, maintain and operate drays, vans, baggage, express and mail wagons, carts, automobiles, carriages, buggies, sleighs and sleds, for the carrying on of the business hereinbefore provided. Also to purchase and sell horses, barns and warehouses, in order to facilitate the carrying on of the above lines of business, also to store and care for all kinds of vehicles, trunks and personal property of every description, and the packing of same in connection therewith. To operate and maintain one or more barns, warehouses and sheds. Also to do general blacksmithing and horse-shoeing business; and to engage in the business of wholesale and retail dealing in feed, hay and grain.

ARTICLE II. The time for the commencement of this corporation shall be June 6, 1910, and the period of its duration shall be thirty years.

ARTICLE III. The names and places of residence of the persons forming this corporation are Thomas B. Jones, Henry C. Huth and Charles Irvin, all of the City of Duluth, St. Louis County, Minnesota.

The management of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Directors, composed of not less than three (3) and not more than seven (7) members. The names and addresses of the first Board of Directors are Thomas B. Jones, Henry C. Huth and Charles Irvin, all of the City of Duluth, St. Louis County, Minnesota.

ARTICLE IV. The first officers of this corporation shall be, President, Thomas B. Jones; Vice-President, Charles Irvin; Secretary and Treasurer, Henry C. Huth. All of the above named officers and directors shall hold their respective offices aforesaid until the first annual meeting of this Corporation to be held in May, 1911, at which time and annually thereafter a Board of Directors shall be elected from and by the stockholders of this corporation. The annual meeting of the corporation shall be held at its principal place of business on the second day of May in each year, immediately after the election of directors, or as soon thereafter as practicable. The directors shall meet and act from their number a president and vice-president, and from their number or from the stockholders a secretary and treasurer. Any officer except that of president and vice-president may be held by one person. The officers and directors of this corporation shall hold their respective offices until their successors have been duly elected and entered upon the discharge of their duties.

ARTICLE V. The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), which shall be paid in, in money or property or both, in such a manner, at such times, and in such amounts as the Board of Directors shall order. The capital stock shall be divided into five hundred (500) shares of the par value of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) each.

ARTICLE VI. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this corporation shall at any time be subject shall be the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00).

ARTICLE VII. The corporation shall at all times have a first lien on all the shares of its stockholders and on dividends declared thereon for any and all indebtedness of such stockholders to the corporation.
