WASHINGTON, May 27.—Professor William R. Vance, dean of the George Washington University law school has been appointed third arbitrator in the dispute over wages between telegraphers and the Southern railway.

AVERT STRIKE BY RAISE.

DENVER, Colo., May 27.—Representatives of 14 railway systems of the west met in Denver yesterday and decided to put into effect at once an increase of wages of six cents an hour for yardmen and to apply here the working rules now in effect in Chicago and eastern yards.

DENVER ELECTS WOMAN. DENVER, Colo., May 27.—Practically complete returns from Tuesday's elections show that Miss Ellis Meredith has been chosen election commissioner, her total of 20,997 exceeding the combined vote of her seven men competitors.

PERSIAN WOMEN, AROUSED, RAISE FUNDS FOR NAUION

The following surprising account of the latest development among the women of Persia is given by a recent traveler in that country: "The emancipation of women and the vindication of their position as partakers in the political life of the nation is generally considered a western, almost an Anglo-Saxon, innovation. There are suffragettes in London and underfrights in New York, but their activities do not seem to have had any marked effect on politics in either country. They break windows in Downing street and hold assemblies in Madison Square, without affecting the budget, the tariff, the lords, or the insurgents. In Persia, however; women have shown themselves to be a real power, a financial power in the state. At Teheran the women have raised the standard of Nationalism in protestation against any attempt to float a foreign loan. They will have no foreign lenders in the Persian budget. The one who appears to be most violently opposed to borrowing money abroad is the wife of the Armenian Ephrem, prefect of police at Teheran. Mrs. Ephrem has formed a company of Persian women whom she ardently addresses and compels to take oath that they will oppose by every possible means the introduction into Persia of a foreign loan. "Persian ladies are selling their most valuable jewelry in order to fill the public purse, and delegations of young women press around the public buildings vowing to sacrifice all for the holy cause of patriotism." The census enumerator was confronted at the door by a meek and apologetic little man. "Who's the head of the house?" asked the census man. "From a strictly legal standpoint," replied the little man, "I suppose I am, but when you get right down to brass tacks, I ain't."

NON-UNION MINERS STRIKE.

WEBB CITY, Mo., May 27.—Several hundred non-union miners employed at the Providence, Electrical and White Dog zinc mines, here have struck on the refusal of the company to increase the wage scale to the figures which obtained before the decreased price of ore "forced" a 10 per cent reduction.
