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BEHARADING AFGHAN REBUKE FOR WIFE'S UNFAITHFULNESS

After having spent eighteen years among the wild tribes of the north-west frontier of India Dr. Theodor L. Pennell, a medical missionary of the Church Missionary Society, has arrived in London on a visit with a wealth of remarkable stories to tell.

"On the Afghan frontier a husband is very jealous of his wife's honor," he said, "and if he has a suspicion that anything is wrong he just cuts off her nose. Some time ago a husband who had shown his displeasure in this barbaric manner brought his wife to our hospital at Bannu, and said he was very sorry. There was very little of the nose left, and there was, therefore, nothing that we could do."

"I told him that if he would pay the money we would get his wife an artificial nose from England. He asked me how much it would cost, and I said \$10. He began to hesitate, and I asked him the reason. 'Well,' he said, 'I could get another wife for \$26.' Eventually he agreed to buy the nose, and his old wife was patched up."

Dr. Pennell gave another illustration of matrimonial jealousy. "One day," he said, "an Afghan chief who had been across the border came back, and saw his wife speaking to a man over the wall of his compound. He at once drew his sword, cut off his wife's head and threw it to the man, saying: 'If you want to speak to her now, you can.'"

CAN RUN FOR OFFICE BUT THEY CAN'T VOTE

MADISON, Wis., June 24.—Women have the right to place on official ballots as candidates for county offices in Wisconsin, although they have no right to vote, according to an opinion rendered by Attorney General F. L. Gilbert.

The opinion was handed down in the case of Miss Nellie M. Archibald, deputy treasurer of Ashland county, who aspires to run for county treasurer.

THREE THINGS A GOOD WIFE SHOULD RESEMBLE

BIRD WOMAN WILL WORK FOR SUFFRAGETTE CAUSE

MOURMELON, France, June 24.—Mlle. Rose Mauring, young and particularly prepossessing in appearance, plans to agitate for women's suffrage by up-to-date methods. She is the second woman to receive an aviator's license from the Aero club of France, and announces that she will make flights in as many places in France as possible within the next four months.

Her aeroplane will be decorated with the suffragette colors and bear a large inscription advocating "votes for women." On each flight she will take up with her suffrage literature which she will throw into the air while the machine is in motion.

The president of Mount Holyoke college is stepping into a new president's house completely furnished by two women designers.

The recently appointed judge of the federal court in Porto Rico will have a feminine staff of assistants. He has appointed four young women to fill important posts connected with the judiciary of the island.

During the seven months ending May 31, 1910, 3,921 notices and articles about women's suffrage have appeared in the daily papers of New York city.

LESS WORRY FOR MOTHER MAKES HOME MORE HAPPY

"What is home without a mother?" Mothers ought to take time for a just appreciation more than a cook and a home needs more than a cook and general housekeeper; it needs the true mother-spirit brooding over it to make it a real rest and comfort.

Mother, learn to save yourself. Look in the mirror at the lines growing so deep between your eyes. Listen to the sharp tones of your own voice as your scolding makes your home-folks glad to leave you as soon as supper is over.

You do not mean to be cross. You are simply trying to accomplish more than was ever expected of you. Just stop and think. Which is more important? A circle of happy faces around the evening's lamp, or that John should have that little rent in his coat mended immediately? Put away sewing until tomorrow and show the children pictures or tell them stories instead.

Which is better, a coconut pie for dinner or a plain lunch eaten under the peach trees in the yard? Don't bake such hot things at all in hot weather. Keep yourself cool and your family healthier on fresh fruit and vegetables.

As soon as you feel tired drop the broom, even in the middle of the floor and darken the room. Then stretch yourself out on the sofa, let every muscle become as limp as a rag shut out your eyes and don't keep planning out your next job. Stay there five, ten, fifteen minutes, even if you cannot sleep—you will feel like a new woman when you pick up your broom.

Have you just come home from shopping? That is harder than housework. Be sure to rest for a few minutes, and if you like tea, drink a good hot cup and eat a bite before you think about getting to work again.

Perhaps your heart is more weary than your body. Perhaps it is one member of your family with the unlucky gift of always saying the wrong thing. Do not let one cross word bring on another. Leave him to his own ill-temper and go apart for a half hour with your favorite magazine, your music or your flowers.

HOME HINTS

Furniture Polish.—An excellent polish for ordinary purposes may be made by mixing three parts of linseed oil and one part spirits of turpentine.

Use a piece of cloth or fine flannel and apply to the surface of the furniture, then rub well in with a pad of wool. Another plan is to use equal proportions of turpentine, linseed oil and vinegar.

A good polish for mahogany is obtained by mixing half a pint of rectified naphtha and two and a half ounces of shellac. Dissolve the latter by leaving it in a warm place, then shake well and use by means of a brush.

Bare wood can be polished with pumice stone, passing it regularly over the surface until smooth; then take powdered tripol and boiled linseed oil and polish to a brilliant surface.

To Clean Paint.—The ordinary whitening sold by grocers and stores is excellent for cleaning paint, and does not injure it in the least.

Mix it with cold water to the consistency of cream; wring a clean cloth out of warm water, squeeze it as dry as possible, dip it in the whitening mixture and rub the paint until all the stains disappear.

A wooden skewer, such as butchers use, is excellent for pushing the cloth into crevices and corners. Rinse off the whitening with warm water and a clean cloth, and then wipe the paint as dry as possible.

If rubbed until quite dry, the polish will be restored to the paint, and it will look like new.

The Carving Knife.—There is a great deal in knowing how to sharpen the carving knife. The steel should be held in the left hand, which should be on a level with the right shoulder, and the knife held almost perpendicularly in the right hand.

The hilt of the knife's edge should be placed at the top of the steel and the blade drawn downward the whole length of both steel and knife, first on one side and then on the other, so that the point of the knife finishes at the hilt of the steel.

The blade should be almost flat on the steel, with the back slightly raised but with only the edge touching it.

About Gloves.—Chamois gloves will be as popular as ever the season. Chamois may appear to be warm but it is not, because the skin is porous and absorbs perspiration.

For street wear these gloves cannot be excelled, and if carefully washed will last for months.

The new silk gloves show changes and improvements in weaves. For instance, there is a new silk glove of an extremely soft, cobweb like fabric, which is said to give none of the crackly feeling the average silk glove produces.

Tucks, Large and Small.—The home dressmaker knows that the tuck is always an acceptable trimming device for simple garments, but it is apt to vary from year to year in the particular size that is favored. This season, however, tucks of all sizes are seen. A lingerie blouse may be made with tucks of the tiniest pin size, or with tucks an inch or more in width.

Especially liked this season are the fine lingerie blouses made with clusters of both wide and narrow tucks, arranged alternately.

The blouse made of solid pin tucking, which was so popular a season or two ago, is not seen as much this year as the one which shows a few wider tucks interspersed.

Reliable Bleach.—A bleach that will lighten the neck when the skin has turned a brownish or yellowish

color can be made from two ounces of lactic acid, one ounce of rose water. This is wiped over the skin several times a day and at night, and allowed to dry in.
