BARGAIN COUNTER BRINGS WOES TO WOMEN WORKERS

The next time you rush to the bargain counter to get your collars or waists at a "greatly reduced price," reflect for a moment over the following words from a Canadian contemporary: "One of the most prolific sources of poverty, vice and crime, one of the greatest agencies in the degradation of women workers is the bargain counter. It stands for all that is bad and debasing, for the conditions in sweatshop factories that force young girls upon the streets, for the ware upon the bargain counters represent immoral goods, the products of unfair establishments that have taken toll in the blood and the tears and abject misery of untold thousands of overworked and underpaid toilers, whose lives are one hopeless and losing struggle with grim poverty, still kindly disposed and charitable women thoughtlessly flock at every opportunity to take advantage of the dishonest prices that mark up the commodities thus displayed for sale.

"Does the buyer ever pause to consider that even at the bargain counter you cannot honestly get something for nothing or for less than half its value, that if the article you secure is acquired at a price beneath its real worth of labor equivalent it must necessarily follow that some one has been robbed in its production. The real employer of labor is not the manufacturer who owns the factory where the goods are produced, or the merchant who keeps them for sale, the real employer is the individual who buys the goods. The people who are responsible for the existence of the sweat shop are they who demand cheap or sweatshop goods, for of necessity the merchant must cater with the kind of goods that are in demand.

"Things might be different if when buying goods the purchaser would but pause and remember that it is the buyer every time who creates the demand, that if you get something for less than its real value, that if you profit at the expense of another that loses just exactly as you may gain. Never mind who may be the real loser. It will not be the manufacturer, who controls the making of the goods or the business men who sell them. Their percentage of profit must come first of all, and it
