BELGIUM PROTECTS ITS PAINTERS BY STATUTES GOVERNING EMPLOYERS

There has recently been passed in Belgium, according to U. S. consul Johnson at Liege, a new law tending to protect house painters against the dangers to which they are exposed in manipulating colors mixed with white lead.

This law provides that contractors and master painters shall use only white lead ground and mixed with oil. The white lead thus used must be manipulated so as to avoid contact with the workman's hands, and splashing is to be prevented.

Contractors and master workmen are requested to see that painters working under them wear a costume and head covering specially reserved for working; that the clothes which the workman takes off before putting on his costume are placed in a place where they can be protected from all poisonous dusts; to provide for the use of their working force all articles required for rinsing and washing the mouth, for washing the face and hands with soap, and properly drying them; must see that they clean themselves properly before taking their food; that all food brought to the workshops or localities where painters are working be kept in a well-closed box or receptacle until ready to be consumed.

Any workman found to be suffering from the effects of lead poisoning, either chronic or intermittent, must be permanently discharged, and any one whose general health is found on examination to be unsatisfactory must be temporarily suspended. A register must be kept, in conformity with the model supplied by the administration, in which a physician is required to note the results of the examinations of the workmen employed.

Contractors and master painters are forbidden to employ men addicted to drunkenness, and no alcoholic beverages are allowed to be brought into the workshops or introduced into the locality where work is being carried on.

N. J. WANTS LIABILITY BILL. NEWARK, Nov. 18.—At a conference of labor representatives held Wednesday under the auspices of the New Jersey State Federation of Labor, a committee of seven was appointed to draw up an employers' liability and compensation bill for submission to the state legislature.

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NEW JERSEY CARMEN HOLD SHORTEST STRIKE RECORD.

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 18.—With a union only forty-eight hours old, conductors and motormen of the River-side Traction company operating between Camden and Trenton, won the shortest trolley strike on record.

The union was formed on Saturday night by Organizer Clarence O. Pratt of Philadelphia. The men held a secret meeting Monday night and decided to declare a strike the next morning. Not a car was operated all day on the forty mile stretch of road, but in the afternoon a committee of the men met C. Merritt Taylor, president of the line, and reached an agreement satisfactory to the strikers.

STRIKERS AND SCABS CLASH

RICHMOND, Ind., Nov. 18.—As a result of a clash between striking union molders of the Robinson Treshing Machine company and non-union men, Edward Decker, a non-union man, was seriously injured last night and others slightly.

Five arrests were made and warrants are out for six more.

MINERS STRIKE IN IRWIN FIELD. IRWIN, Pa., Nov. 18.—Union coal miners are on strike in the Irwin field to compel recognition of the union and the "closed shop."

MEN WANT INCREASE. PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 18.—Two hundred packing house employes are on strike here. They demand shorter working hours and an increase of wages.
