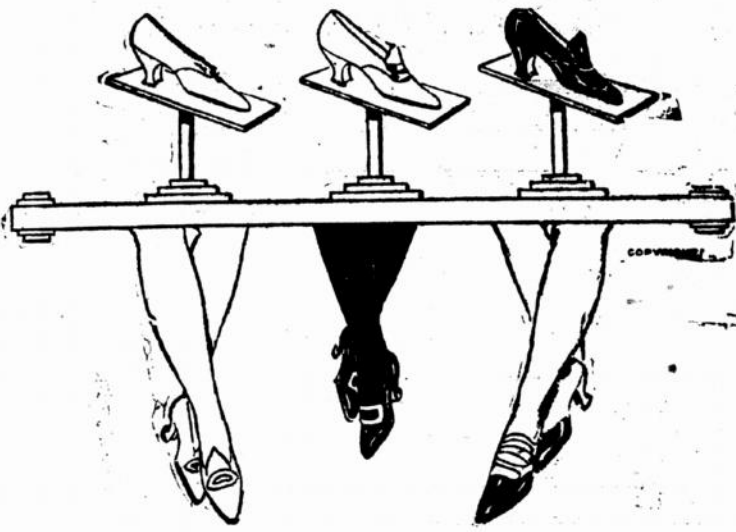

GLOBE MINERS SEND MONEY TO MICHIGAN

Separated by 2,000 Miles Arizona Union Shows Sympathy for Copper Strikers.

In the current number of the Miners' Magazine there is this pretty little story of fraternal bounds of one group of miners for their fellows 2,000 miles away.

"Globe Miners' union No. 60, W. F. M., of Globe, Arizona, has proven its loyalty to the men, women and children of the copper district of Michigan, who, since July 23, 1913, have borne all the outrages that the villainous ingenuity of thugs and Cossacks could inflict upon them to exterminate unionism from the profit-reservation of the copper barons.

"On March 14th Globe Miners' union raised \$700 through the raffle of an automobile, and a dance, and forwarded a draft for this amount to be applied to the strike fund of Michigan.

"Though almost 2,000 miles separate the miners of Globe, Ariz., from the strikers of the copper district of Michigan, yet that fraternity that is born of unionism spans the distance, and generous hearts in Arizona are yearning for the time when the miner of Michigan will establish the right to join hands with his brother under the flag of organized labor."

NEW YORK HARBOR WORKERS IN BATTLE

Big Water Front Strike for One Day's Rest in Seven—Duluth Men Interested.

Duluth tugmen will be interested in the strike of the harbor boatmen in New York. All oilers, deckhands, firemen, floatmen and other workers employed on the tugboats of the B. & O. Railroad and on the 30 tugboats of the Russell Towing company quit work last Tuesday.

The strike was called to enforce the demand for one day off in seven. The union involved is the Harbor Boatmen's union affiliated with the International Seamen's union. The strike is spreading and unless the demands of the union are complied with it will involve all the harbor workers in New York.

Should a general strike be called it will involve the Lackawanna, Lehigh Valley, Jersey Central, New York, New Haven & Hartford and Erie railroads, the Bush Terminal company and the Eastern District Terminal company. The union officials claimed yesterday that the general strike, if called, would probably start by Saturday and that it would involve about 5,000 men in this port.

HILLMAN IS BETTER; VISITOR IN DULUTH

N. S. Hillman of Two Harbors, member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, and the lone Socialist member of the last two legislatures, was a visitor in Duluth during the week. Mr. Hillman was a caller at The Labor World office.

Almost one year ago, Mr. Hillman was injured in a railroad wreck. He suffered a severe laceration of his limb, which kept him bedfast for seven months. The process of healing has been slow, and it was only a few days ago that he was able to walk without crutches. While still a trifle lame, Mr. Hillman expects to fully recover and be back on his engine at the opening of the ore shipping season.

ADAMS SWALLOWS MACHINE SET BAIT

After Diligent Search Old Time Legislative Fixers Capture Acceptable and Harmless Man.

Charles E. Adams swallowed the bait as we intimated he would in our last issue, and is now the candidate who will be favored by the interests to prevent A. G. McKnight from going to the State Senate from the 57th Legislative District. Former representative A. L. Warner was importuned to carry the banner for the machine and the interests, but he positively refused to be made the goat. Then they turned to Adams and by appealing to his vanity and his overweening desire for public office and the limelight, succeeded in inducing him to undertake a task which will become more and more humiliating to him as the election draws near.

As a part of the same deal with W. J. North, who had been groomed for the Senate job, conveniently withdrew from the race and became the candidate for the House. The machine is congratulating itself upon having made a wonderfully clever solution of what seemed to be a very intricate and puzzling problem. They feel they have accomplished the difficult task of securing a candidate for the Senate who, because of his colorless and evasive attitude on public questions, will be acceptable alike to the saloons and churches, and who, at the same time, will command the unwavering support of the public service corporations. They apparently have left the labor vote entirely out of consideration, calculating undoubtedly that the labor vote was a negligible factor in this district.

We predict that their sense of joyous accomplishment will be short-lived. The game they have played is an old one but the day has gone by when it can be successfully worked. The people realize that the legislatures, which have disgraced America, are those composed of the men who have had no positive convictions, but have been selected because they were "Good Fellows." The revolt against this condition has awakened the electorate generally and we believe the electors of the 57th district will not be fooled for a moment by the Adams candidacy, but will support by a big majority the candidacy of A. G. McKnight, whose public record stamps him as one who never trims on any public issue and who as a private citizen, has ever been found on the firing line in the fight against privilege.

TWO MOVING PICTURE SHOWS HELD UNFAIR

The local union of Theatrical Stage Employees have placed the Grand Theater at West Duluth and the Bijou at the West End on the unfair list of the union, because of the refusal of the management in each of the theaters to employ union operators or stage hands.

The union will bring the matter before the Trades Assembly, and ask for official endorsement for its action, after which union workmen in West Duluth and the West End will be expected to withdraw their patronage from these theaters.
