STATE COMMISSION LOSES LEISERSON

Head of Free Employment Bureau Resigns—Will Enter Larger Field.

That the state of Wisconsin is losing a man who has done remarkable work in alleviating labor problems and who could ill afford to be missed, is the opinion of a number of Superior citizens interested in social problems, upon hearing of the resignation of William M. Leiserson, state superintendent of the free employment offices, who has accepted a position on the federal commission, appointed to investigate national industrial relations. His resignation took effect July 1.

Mr. Leiserson is a product of the University of Wisconsin. He received his Ph. D. degree at the University of Columbia. He majored in labor problems, and is now one of the recognized authorities in the United States on the employment problem. The success of the state free employment office in partially solving the unemployment problem, has been due to his efforts. Revolutionary regulations to prevent quite prevalent abuses by private employment offices, have been promoted by Mr. Leiserson. A federal employment exchange system is one of the pet ideas of the Wisconsin man. It is now quite certain that the plan will be put into execution, and Mr. Leiserson because of his experience with the Wisconsin employment offices, has been selected as a member of the administrative committee to conduct an investigation pending the establishment of the federal labor bureau.

Mr. Leiserson studied economics under John R. Commons and Richard T. Ely, the famous Wisconsin professors, and it was largely through the influence of Professor Commons that Leiserson was sent to Glasgow and other European cities to study European labor problems. That labor problem experts will be in great demand as soon as the federal labor employment exchange is established is the opinion of Mr. Leiserson.

PATROLMAN DOESN'T APPROVE OF CLASSICS

Socialist Orator Arrested Under Old Ordinance On Disorderly Conduct.

A virtuous policeman and an oratorical street corner speaker were the cause of an arrest last Tuesday evening near First avenue west and Superior street.

Moses Baritz who has been speaking on the street corner under the auspices of the Socialist party had unintentionally "insulted" the policeman on the beat, by using a phrase, which Mr. Baritz says was used in a poetical sense and with no intent to slander or ridicule.

The phrase used was, "To hell with heaven, and to heaven with hell" which Mr. Baritz says was part of his peroration and in line with all of the English literaturists with whom he is conversant, i. e., Shakespeare, Dante, Milton, Borworth, etc. These gentlemen had not been listed on the police docket so patrolman Cavanaugh could not be expected to be familiar with them or their alleged writings. It has been hinted that warrants will be sworn out immediately and these vile creatures rounded up and hauled into court.

\$50 bail was furnished for Baritz which was later reduced to \$15 through the efforts of his attorney Richard Jones. His hearing has been set over to next Tuesday when Baritz expects this "piece of childish ignorance" will be set aside.

NORMAL SCHOOL JOB DECLARED UNFAIR

Building of Superior Normal School to Be Done With Non-Union Labor.

The State Normal School in Superior is to be finished with non-union men according to an understanding among the board of Normal School regents.

This stand was taken after a conference of the board had been held in regards to the strike of the structural iron workers which occurred after the contractor R. B. Hartman had attempted to pay the men off at a rate of 33 1/2 cents per hour. The union scale being 62 1/2 cents.

Clough Gates the local member of the board attempted to bring about a compromise and did all in his power to have the board overlook the difference in pay and allow the work to proceed with union men. The majority of the board however felt that the wage demanded by the union was exorbitant for the class of work that is being done, i. e., bending of iron rods preparatory to laying them in the concrete mold.

As a consequence of this the resolution passed last week by the building trades council is still in effect. The resolution is as follows: We, the building trades council of Superior, hereby declare the attitude of Contractor R. B. Hartman and the state board of Normal school regents unfair to organized labor.

MOLDERS WALK OUT IN NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, July 3.—The strike of the molders at the shop of S. M. Frank & Co., 222 East Seventeenth street, which started a few days ago because of alleged discrimination against three union men, is still on. Unless a speedy settlement is reached it is expected the pipe makers, polishers and the workers in the other departments will join the walkout.

EARLY CLOSING FOR BUTCHERS' UNION

The Butchers' local union No. 12 are endeavoring to have agreements completed with the various shops in the city for early closing.

It is stipulated in the agreement for closing at 10:00 p. m. Saturdays and nights before holidays and all day holidays.

PRINTERS RAISE WAGES
BOONE, Iowa, July 3.—Beginning July 1, printers in this city received a wage increase of \$2 per week and \$1 a week additional for two years thereafter. Carpenters are standing firm for their demand for a 5-cent-an-hour increase. Three contractors have accepted the new rate.

TRADES & LABOR TO WAIT ON SCHOOL MEN

A committee has been appointed by the trades and labor assembly to wait on the school board and the Normal School regents in regards to letting out bids for various work to be done on the several school buildings in the city.

RACINE WINS ITS WATER PLANT FIGHT

Application of bond holders of the Racine Water company for a permanent injunction restraining the city of Racine from taking over of the water plant was denied in federal court Monday by Judges W. H. Seaman, F. E. Baker and F. A. Geiger.

An appeal to the United States supreme court was granted but a request for a writ of superedeas was denied. This leaves the city of Racine and the water company free to go ahead with the arrangement to turn the water plant over to the municipality up to the point of the actual transfer of the property.

The main contention of the plaintiffs was that the property could not be taken in a condemnation suit with out a trial by jury and that they as mortgagees were the real owners of the property.

The court held that the trial by jury had been waived by the water company consenting to the purchase of the plant by the city and that the plaintiff had failed to show that they were damaged by the proposed transfer of the property to the city.

LOOK! SUPERIOR DELEGATES GO HERE

Oshkosh Claims to Be An Awfully Virtuous City, Moral Tone Greatly Improved.

OSHKOSH, Wis., July 3.—The employment of girls at reasonable wages, all of whom resided at home and none of whom had been found to be immoral was the gist of testimony given to the Wisconsin vice commission by several drygoods merchants at a hearing here today. Representatives of other business concerns told the commission that girls in their employ were required to be of good moral character but none made it his business to watch them after working hours.

DREDGEMEN ELECT KELLY AS DELEGATE

Dan Kelly has been chosen by the Superior dredgemen to represent their organization at the Wisconsin State Federation of Labor convention which will be held at Oshkosh July 15-18.

To date there has been seven delegates chosen to represent Superior unions at the coming convention.

PAPER MAKERS ASK FOR HIGHER WAGES

BOSTON, July 3.—The executive board of the Pulp Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers union held a meeting in this city on the question of a renewal of contract with the International Paper company; which is being urged by this union and the International Union of Paper Makers. A strike vote will be called if necessary. The contract which was made between the men and the mills for one year expired May 1. The unions asked that the contract be renewed with the addition of a general increase of wages and a minimum wage clause. The employees want a minimum wage limit to be fixed at \$12 per week. The Great Northern Paper company has granted these concessions to their employees but the International has refused thus far.

BUILDING TRADES STRIKE IN MADISON

MADISON, Wis., July 3.—Practically all building operations are tied up in this city today as result of an order from the international headquarters of brick masons, calling all men off the jobs to help the carpenters in their strike.

It is estimated that 600 men are on strike.

The carpenters went on strike about three weeks ago after their demand for an increase of 5 cents per hour and recognition of the closed shop had been turned down by the local contractors. The scale of wages was 47 1/2 cents per hour.

Although no action has been taken to stop work on the capitol, it is said that a move will be made to halt operations.

COLORADO UNIONS TO SHOW STRENGTH

DENVER, July 3.—Organized labor in this city has issued invitations to unionists throughout the state to assemble in Denver on Labor Day and hold a monster celebration for the purpose of impressing on politicians the views of workers for industrial justice. It is said this move is being favorably received throughout the state. The project also is intended to answer those politicians who are now endeavoring to capture the fall elections under the cry "law and order."
