Does Municipal Ownership Pay?

The city of Winnipeg owns its electric light and power plant. Duluth owns its own gas and water plant, but does not own its own electric light and power plant.

We have in our possession a bill for electric light for the month of August, 1914 paid by a Winnipeg workman.

This man's home contains 54 electric lights of 25 Watts each. Fifty-four 25 Watt electric lights is a pretty good illumination for any man's home.

Our Winnipeg friend consumed 25 kilowatt hours of current for the month of August, 1914.

The amount of his bill, for the month of August, 1914 was 83 CENTS.

If that Winnipeg workman should move his house, just as it stands, to Duluth, and get his current from the Duluth-Edison Electric company, and burn exactly the same amount of current in Duluth as he did in Winnipeg his bill would be \$2.25 per month.

Municipal ownership of his electric light and power plant saves that Winnipeg workman \$1.42

per month. He puts \$1.42 in his pocket every month for the simple reason that he owns his own electric light and power plant.

At the end of a year he has \$17.04 in his pocket that he would not have if he did not own his own plant.

And \$17.04 will buy a lot of coal. Or it will pay a whole month's rent.

Or it will buy half a dozen pairs of shoes for the workman's family.

Does municipal ownership pay? It certainly does pay.

It hands out the cash to you, every month, to spend for the other things you need.

But suppose your municipal electric light and power plant has strong competition from a private plant, then what?
