MANY MILLIONS IN TRADE UNIONS

Commissioner Lynch of New York Labor Department Makes Interesting Report.

Commissioner Lynch of the New York department of labor reports that there are in the world 14,113,611 trade-union members, an increase of 1,100,607 in a year. The larger membership are:

Great Britain and Ireland	3,993,769
Germany	3,213,586
United States	2,604,701
France	1,604,701
Italy	971,667
Austria	532,970
Australia	432,224

Bulgaria and Turkey do not appear in the table, but Spain, Serbia, Rumania, Croatia, Bosnia and Herzegovina are represented.

Germany, France and Austria show decreases even before the war, because of hard times; Germany on January 1, 1913, had stood practically even with Great Britain and Ireland.

The biggest American unions are connected with transportation, 667,845. Next come building and stone-working, 543,460, and mines and quarries, 423,300.

American unions raised in 1913 \$14,139,328. Nearly nine millions were expended in death benefits, only three and one-half millions for strikes. The \$1,355,000 used for sick benefits seems relatively small, but not all unions make such allowances. The Typographical union paid \$242,650 in old-age pensions.

Names unfamiliar here occur in foreign classifications—Czech unions in Austria, rival socialist and Christian unions in Belgium and Germany, Hirsch-Duncker unions in the later country; in Holland the Christian unions are even divided into Protestant and Catholic.

British unions spend \$19,000,000 a year—one-third for strikes—and have \$25,000,000 in accumulated funds.

ENGLAND TRADE UNIONS AND HER UNEMPLOYED

By an English Trade-Unionist.

An effect of the war has been to produce an abnormally high rate of unemployment. The situation is seriously imperiling the future usefulness of trade-unions, and has already involved some of them in insolvency. It is sincerely to be hoped that the government will make the trade-unions a generous appropriation grant and allow them to administer it through the ordinary machinery under government sanction. No one will complain against the government for any action already taken, as for instance, the moratorium to prevent financial collapse, guarantees for war risks to shippers, and bankers' certificates to assist manufacturers. Trade-unions have been built up and funds accumulated to meet the ordinary conditions that capital and labor impose on each other. They are, in a way, national institutions, and in a hundred years they have been the only organizations providing non-penalizing relief during times of distress. Today trade-unions are faced with an unparalleled situation in being compelled to pay unemployment benefit caused through the war. With the cotton trade in such a deplorable condition and the outlook darker than at any previous time in its history, abnormal distress is bound to prevail in Lancashire. The circumstances of the cotton trade are such that they demand special treatment. They are justified in asking the government to come to their aid.

CHOICE RECIPES

Banana Ice Cream.—Scald two cups of milk in a double boiler and when it is just scalded pour it over three beaten eggs. Return to the double boiler, stirring constantly until the mixture coats the spoon, add a dash of salt, a half cupful of sugar, and when the custard is cold a teaspoonful of lemon juice and three mashed bananas.

Frozen Plum Fudding.—Scald a pint of milk and when hot pour over three well-beaten egg yolks, add a cupful of sugar and cook over hot water until the mixture coats the spoon; strain and flavor with melted chocolate. Then fold in the stiffly-beaten whites and one cupful of whipped cream. Prepare the fruit to be used, steaming the raisins and currants and adding the finely-shredded citron after soaking in orange juice.

Uncooked Mince-meat.—Into an old-fashioned crock put alternately in thin layers one pound of fresh beef suet, finely chopped, two pounds of seeded raisins, one pound of pitted dates, half a pound of mixed nuts, one pound of currants, two pounds of "A" sugar, two pounds of sour apples, chopped, half a pound each of candied ginger and citron, one groded nutmeg, one teaspoonful of salt, the juice and rind of two lemons and oranges, two ounces of allspice, cinnamon and cloves mixed. Add a pint of cider, which is cold but has been boiled. Stir occasionally for a few days then can.

Grapes in Jelly.

To one quart of hot grape juice add two tablespoonfuls of dissolved gelatin. Place a layer at the bottom of a mold; chill, then add a row of grapes cut in half and seeded; then more liquid and again chill until set. Repeat until the mold is full. When jellied, unmold and garnish with whipped cream.

Eggs a la Shellburne.

Cut slices from the top of six tomatoes of uniform size and take out enough pulp to allow a raw egg to be broken inside. Cover with bits of butter, and with a toothpick fasten a rasher of bacon over the top of each tomato. Cook in very hot oven until the eggs are set (about eight minutes).

When Making Pillows.

In making new pillows have the feathers first inclosed in a bag of cheesecloth or thin muslin. Then at any time the ticking may be removed for washing, and even the feathers may be washed in the inner bag without flying all over the house.

Use a Pitcher.

Instead of using a mixing bowl or pan for your batter cakes, use a pitcher with a lip, and pour your batter out. It saves time and trouble and your cakes will be more uniform in size than when you spoon your batter out.

Laundry Wrinkle.

Place a slice of lemon with the rind removed in your boiler of clothes. The result will be clothes beautifully clean and white, without in any way injuring them.

The Germans are famous for their soups of various kinds and one of the charms of them are the soup garnishes.

Potato Dumplings

Grate four cold boiled potatoes and add to them one cupful of stale bread crumbs, soaked in a little milk, just enough to moisten; add two eggs, two tablespoonfuls of flour and salt and pepper. Form into balls and steam or boil 20 minutes. Turn into a serving dish and sprinkle with two cupfuls of bread crumbs fried in butter.
