DO IT FOR DULUTH IN PRACTICE

Builders Exchange Allege That Some Duluthians Employ Outsiders.

ARRAIGN BUYING OF MATERIAL OUT OF TOWN

General Plea for Patronizing of Home Talent and Home Goods.

"If you have a residence to build, or a business block to erect, employ a Duluth architect, see that a Duluth contractor gets the job. Buy your material in Duluth, and employ Duluth labor. Show those on the outside that it is Duluth, first, last and all the time."

Such is the essence of a letter issued Friday by members of the Duluth Builders' exchange. That several Duluth men have employed outside architects to plan their residences and buildings during the last year, is the allegation of the exchange. The letter follows:

"Do it for Duluth" has been the slogan adopted by the merchants of Duluth, they claiming that a concerted action on the part of all citizens would increase business in Duluth, would develop it along commercial lines, would attract outside capital and induce large enterprises to locate here, would make it a bigger and better Duluth and enable us to take the part we should in relation with other cities in the United States. The theory is perfect. A great deal has been done in making Duluth recognized and it will eventually be one of the largest cities of our nation. The Great Lakes ports. This has been accomplished by the untiring efforts of some of our citizens, who have unselfishly given not only their time but also their money to bring this about. It would be well if the example be used as a criterion. SUPERIOR TRADES ASSEMBLY ADOPT RESOLUTIONS

Protest Made Against Conviction of Lawson in Colorado. Walsh Praised.

The committee appointed at the last meeting of the Superior Trades and Labor assembly has drawn up two resolutions in compliance with the instructions of the assembly.

The first resolution is a protest against the unjust conviction of John R. Lawson by a packed jury in the state of Colorado for a crime which it is not contended he committed. In most states murder in the first degree must be premeditated and this certainly was not true of the alleged murder in the battle at Ludlow. Again in a civilized state a "murder" in self defense or in defense of the home which is the palace of all men is justifiable.

Resolution of Protest.

Following is the resolution adopted on the Lawson case: Whereas, the constitution of the United States provides that no state shall exercise any law contrary to the doctrines expressed in the United States constitution and article SIX of the amendments to the constitution provides that "in all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right of a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state etc.," and

Whereas, in the state of Colorado John R. Lawson has been convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to life imprisonment by an apparently prejudiced jury for a crime which it was proved without a doubt he did not and could not have committed; therefore be it

Resolved, by the Superior Trades and Labor assembly that we here and now protest against this unjust conviction; and further

Resolved, that the attention of the U. S. government be called to this travesty on justice and that copies of these resolutions be forwarded to the United Mine Workers of America, Congressman Lenroot, the governor of Colorado, the public press and a copy spread upon the minutes of this assembly.

Commend Frank P. Walsh. That the industrial relations committee has done a great deal of good in the estimation of the resolutions committee and the Trades and Labor assembly is shown in the resolution adopted commending Chairman Walsh and asking Congressman Lenroot to work for an appropriation at the next session of congress to be applied to the continuation of the committee.

Whereas, one of the fundamental doctrines of American government is justice to the most humble citizen under the flag; and

Whereas, for years there has existed in the United States an industrial unrest that has given rise to many grave problems, not the least of which are unemployment, strikes and lockouts, often leading to riots and bloodshed; and

Whereas, too frequently the powers of government have been used by the employing class to suppress uprisings of the workers against unjust and intolerable conditions; and

Whereas, congress has had appointed a committee on industrial relations, of which Frank P. Walsh is chairman, to investigate the causes of the industrial unrest; and

Resolved, that the Superior Trades and Labor assembly does hereby commend and support Frank P. Walsh, chairman of the U. S. industrial relations committee for the manner in

LABOR DIVISION SUPPORTS WILSON

Labor Federation Department Refuses to Ask "Peace-at-Any-Price."

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 18.—The heads of international trades unions, with 500,000 members, comprising the building trades department of the American Federation of Labor, voted decisively at their closing session here Tuesday against a peace-at-any-price protest to President Wilson. After debating for more than an hour, an appeal from Representative Frank Buchanan, Seventh Illinois district, that the building trades be enlisted in a nation-wide movement to influence the course of the white house administration against any possibility of war with Germany, the leaders flatly refused.

In a terse statement council officials explained that they regarded it as a patriotic duty to stand back of the president and avoid any action tending to embarrass his conduct of a great national task.

Congressman Buchanan is said to be friendly to German influences in the west. Drastic action to stop the big strike, which has completely suspended building operations in Chicago and thrown thousands of men in many trades out of employment, was taken at an all night session when 10 days were given to the Chicago Building Trades council in which to cancel an unlawful agreement with the General employers' association in the western metropolis.

The ultimatum automatically abrogates the charter of the Chicago Trades council if it not met within the time fixed.

BARBERS' BOARD NOW REORGANIZED

Shops Will Be Inspected by Health Officers—Old Body to Conduct Exams.

MADISON, June 18.—The reorganization of the state barbers' board is now completed, the Baxter bill having been signed by the governor. This is the first bill placed on the statute books which carries out in any degree the promise of consolidation of commissions.

The state barbers' board still exists as an examining board only, the inspection work of barber shops being left to health officers, both local and state.

The fee for barbers is reduced from \$2 to \$1 annually, and the fee for a journeyman's license is increased from \$1 to \$5. The examination for a master barber's license can be taken within one year of granting of journeyman's license, without further charge.

The law transfers the power of appointments from the governor to the state board of health. The new board is expected to be chosen by the board of health soon, the bill providing that the three members of the examining board are to be selected before the first of August.

NOVA SCOTIA PASSES GOOD COMPENSATION ACT

HALIFAX, Nova Scotia, June 18.—John Joy, vice president of the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress, declares the Nova Scotia compensation act, passed last month, is the best legislation of its kind in the Dominion. He says:

"The act provides for the injured workman during his disability, even if it lasts his lifetime. Under this law, litigation is pushed to one side and the question as to the right of compensation and the amount payable is determined by a board of three members. Compensation is payable in periodical sums, thus providing for continual maintenance of the injured workman or his dependents.

"The act further provides that no agreement between employer and the workman to forego the benefits of the act is valid; no part of the amount payable to the accident fund by the workman, and no compensation can be attached, charged or assigned without the approval of the board."

All workers are included in the new law except casual workers, members of police and fire departments and those engaged in clerical and office work.

NEWS OF THE UNIONS.

MUSICIANS UNION.

At the last meeting of the Duluth Superior local of musicians it was voted to furnish a band to lead the parade of the Wisconsin Federation of Labor convention which will meet in Superior July 21. It is planned to arrange for a 50-piece band.

The Third Regiment band left last week for the U. S. T. convention in Winona and from there went to Lake City to attend the state encampment. BOAT CLUB UNFAIR. It is announced that for the time being at least the boat club will not be recognized as union houses, as a union orchestra will not be employed at either the main house or the branch. It is hoped that this condition will be adjusted within a short time.



CAN YOU TIE THIS LIE?

BENZONIA, Mich., June 18.—Hen Stratton, the Luther Burbank of Benzononia county, is conducting a series of interesting experiments with his chewing gum tree. He promises a demonstration this spring but the cold snap stopped the sap running and the fellows who went down to his sugar camp came back disappointed and had to buy their gum at the store. Last fall lightning struck three trees in Hen's woods, and when he looked over the damage he had an idea. One of his young maples was split in two, the big spruce next to it was splintered and the slippery elm a few feet away was hewed from top to bottom. Hen pulled the three trees together, bound them tight together for 20 feet and let them grow that way. He thinks the sap of the sugar maple will flow through the spruce gum and turn out the finest kind of maple-flavored gum. He added the slippery elm to make it softer chewing.—Milwaukee Journal.
