BETTER WAGES FOR MIGRATORY WORKERS

Good Conditions Brought On By European War Should Be Made Permanent.

Conditions for unskilled workers in Duluth were never as good as at the present time, and these men were never in as strong a position to prepare and fortify themselves for future emergencies as at present.

Conditions Improved.

Several reasons are given by employment agents as the cause of improved conditions. First, the unbounded prosperity of the country. Second, the great demand for workmen in Northwestern Canada.

All of these facts should help the migratory worker, and eventually all classes of workers, for the migratory worker is one of the big influences in the regulation of wages.

The migratory worker in Duluth has for years been the victim of circumstances, and his wages have depended upon what conditions would allow him to ask.

EMPLOYERS WOULD RETARD PROGRESS

Manufacturers Oppose Child Labor Laws and Urge Employers to Fight Unions.

NEW YORK, June 1.—The National Association of Manufacturers, which was so roundly condemned by a congressional investigating committee a few years ago, held a convention in this city recently.

The gathering was of the regulation anti-union standard, although this association has been attracting the less attention since congress has exposed its lobbying methods.

POND, CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY COMMISSIONER

W. A. Pond is a candidate for county commissioner for the Fifth District. Mr. Pond has been a resident of Duluth since December, 1901. He first began work here as a street railway employee, entering the service January 2, 1902, and resigning October 12, of the same year to enter the coal and wood business.

For political purposes one or two of Mr. Pond's enemies have circulated a story that he worked as a strike-breaker during the street railway strike of 1899. This is an absolute falsehood, as Mr. Pond did not arrive in Duluth until 1901 and he was not employed by the Street Railway Company until 1902, nearly three years after the strike.

Mr. Pond sympathizes with the program of union labor and if elected county commissioner will do his best to carry out the ideals of workingmen.

COAL TRUST SCORED FOR HIGH PRICES

Advance In Wages Used Merely As Pretext to Rob the Consumer.

The advance in the price of coal is causing general comment in Duluth, and the coal barons are being castigated in round terms for using the pretext of higher wages as a cause for boosting prices.

This is shown in an editorial in The Duluth Herald, in the issue of May 30, which follows: "COAL WAGES, COAL PRICES AND THE HAPLESS CONSUMER."

"In 1900 the hard coal companies gave the miners an increase in wages amounting to about fifteen cents a ton. Then they added twenty-three cents to the price of coal."

"The anthracite trust must be engaged in the interesting experiment of finding out just how much the long suffering, patient American consumer can stand."

Consumers are stirred up over this attempt of the coal barons to make unjust profits, and are suggesting drastic federal action to supplement the trust laws. Among other remedies are suggested the taking over of coal properties by the government and the operation of them for the people.

ALIENS IN DULUTH STUDY CITIZENSHIP

Opportunity Awaits Labor Leaders in Enlisting Interest of New Citizens.

In offering a free course of study in citizenship for foreigners, the Duluth Young Men's Christian association, together with the federal and county authorities, are taking the right step to help newly arrived immigrants, and the labor unions of this city should also get busy and start these men in the right direction along labor lines.

The remorseless grind of work in the sweat shops and the advantage taken by the unscrupulous employer, often drives the new citizen to revolt and to crime.

UPHOLDS TEACHERS' RIGHT TO ORGANIZE

Illinois Court Annuls Resolution Passed By Chicago Board of Education.

CHICAGO, June 1.—The appellate court has annulled the so-called "Loeb rule," passed by the Chicago board of education, and which prohibits its teachers from maintaining a union affiliated to the American Federation of Labor.

"The law is that the board may stipulate for the amount of training, the degree of proficiency and the physical fitness of its teaching employees, but it cannot provide that its teaching shall be done only by certain persons, or classes of persons, members or non-members of certain societies," said the court.

Two-Platoon Plan Favored. SAN FRANCISCO, June 1.—The Downtown association, composed of business men, has unanimously declared in favor of motorizing the fire department, which will make possible the inauguration of a two-platoon system and a 12-hour day for firemen.
