**ORGANIZING OF MEN STOPPED BY TOWER OF BABEL METHODS**

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 12.—Biblical methods, such as were used to stop the construction of the famous tower of Babel, were used here by the packing companies to separate the workers and prevent exchange of unionistic ideas, charged striking packing house workers today. As many different nationalities as could be obtained were employed, the idea being that each nationality was jealous and suspicious of the other because of their inability to converse.

Foremen of gangs, generally rough-necks and slave drivers of the old school, did not hesitate to knock down the Pole or the Greek, knowing that the rest of the gang of other nationalities were suspicious and jealous of the victim.

The strike started when 33 unorganized employes of the Cox & Gordon company asked that wages be raised from 20 to 22½ cents an hour. They worked from 60 to 66 hour a week. The request was refused and the workers joined the Meat Cutters and Butcher Workers' union. The company then appealed to the Meat Packer's association and the following firms are now involved because their employes declined to act as strikebreakers:

St. Louis Dressed Beef company, St. Louis Independent Packing company, Key Packing company, Belz Provision company, Sartorius Provision company, Hell Packing company, and the Cox & Gordon company.

**AWAKE LABOR MEN! ELECT YOUR OWN KIND TO OFFICE**

Organized labor is, and if it is not it should be, intensely interested in the election of members of the legislature. While organized labor has no favors to ask upon the passage of such legislation as will materially assist all the working people of the state. Indeed any sort of a labor bill is of benefit to all the people.

Scarcely a day passes that we are not rebuked by an injured workman or his friend about the insufficiency of the payments allowed in the workmen's compensation law. The Labor World of its editor has nothing to do with the passage of the present act. It was framed by employers of the state, and about the only part we played in it was to force the legislature to improve the bill presented by the employers.

**For State Insurance.**

The law does not represent our ideal of workingmen's compensation. We want to see the principle of state insurance written into law in this state. State insurance means a fight. We must run up against the powerful influence of the insurance companies and their agents who do business in every locality in the state. These agents are strong politically. They are now at work endeavoring to elect their own kind of men to the legislature. Organized labor seems asleep. Its members must be aroused to action. So this is an appeal to them to get out and hustle for the right kind of men.

**Jensen A Good Man.**

There are three legitimate districts in Duluth. In the district comprising the old First and Second wards the labor candidate is John E. Jensen of the Painters' union. He is opposed by W. A. Hicken, former commissioner of Public Safety, a good man in many respects, but entirely out of touch with the appeals of labor for legislative relief from the abuses they now suffer. Mr. Jensen understands what labor wants. He is a tried and true man. He has stood the acid test in the past and he can be depended upon to vote right with labor and for all progressive legislation at all times. He is a clean man with the right kind of vision. Forward looking people in this district will make no mistake in electing Mr. Jensen to the legislature.

**Borgen Should Vote Right.**

There are only three candidates and two to be elected in the legislative district comprising the old Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth wards of the city of Duluth. Two of the candidates have not declared themselves on a state insurance act, and the third may be classed as opposed to the measure, for he is an attorney for the insurance companies.

Anton Borgen will probably be elected in this district without any trouble. Mr. Borgen is an honest, careful and conservative man. He is not quite in touch with the demands and wants of labor, but he is always open to reason. He is a Norwegian by birth, and therefore his national pride should prompt him to vote for a state insurance law. Norway is the mother country for state insurance. It is working more successfully there than in any other nation. We may expect a good vote from Mr. Borgen.

**Meldahl All Right.**

In the district comprising the old Seventh and Eighth wards of the city Andrew Meldahl is a union labor candidate. He has been a member of the Lathers' union for nearly twenty years. He will vote and work for state insurance. He understands, like most union labor men, what is wanted by the working classes. He is a safe man to vote for.

Space will not permit in this issue a review of the entire legislative situation in this county. It will be given in the next number of this paper. The range workmen about Hibbing and Chisholm are urged not to forget Fred Bessette of Ore, the tried and true friend of labor legislation. He is under pledge to work for state insurance. He has spent considerable time in a study of the question, and will bring to the legislature ripe knowledge on the subject. A vote for Fred Bessette will be a vote for a friend of labor legislation.—W. E. McE.
