FARMERS PROTEST ALLEGED INVASION OF THEIR RIGHTS

With Representatives of Labor, Demand Relief From Governor Burnquist.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Feb. 21.—Protesters against alleged infringement of their constitutional rights, a delegation of 100 farmers and representatives of union labor called at the capitol Tuesday to demand from Governor Burnquist measures of relief. Speakers of the farmers included Carl Beck, chairman of the committee on arrangements of the national Non-partisan league, though the farmers declared the move was not primarily of the league. Magnus Johnson and Fred E. Osbourne, also were among the leaders of the farmers, and Corcoran and George Grenville, of the labor men.

"We want to find out whether the constitution is suspended permanently or only temporarily," said Mr. Osbourne. "Everywhere the sheriffs are 'butting in' to tell us what we can and cannot do. Farmers start to hold a peaceable meeting and the sheriffs go crazy."
"The average man does not realize the situation in Minnesota," said Mr. Corcoran. "Conditions here are almost as bad as they were in Colorado just before the Ludlow massacre."
A memorial presented to the governor declared that "men have been coerced, assaulted, kidnapped; law has been denied; the process of social order has been menaced by the approach of anarchy." It cited 20 Non-partisan meetings alleged to have been prevented or dispersed, "unlawfully." Suspension of the sheriff and county attorney of Jackson county; the sheriff of Rice county and the acting sheriff of Ramsey county was asked.
