LABOR LAWS IN WAR'S CRUCIBLE

ohn B. Andrews Points Out Constructive Legislation Needed.

NEW YORK, March 14.—"No one unlar with the traditions and the leadership of the American Federation of Labor will doubt that trade unionism will be pushed forward by its war," declared Secretary John B. Andrews of the American Association of Labor Legislation in an address "Labor Laws in the Crucible" before the National Institution of Social Science.

"Even though faced with peculiar difficulties, including the absorption of an army of invading women and a host of unskilled diluting mechanics, organized labor was never in a more advantageous position to assert its wishes and to have its policies 'topped'."

In labor legislation prompt adoption of a unified and adequate public employment service, extension and improvement of accident compensation and enactment of workmen's health insurance were urged by Dr. Andrews.

"While earnestly sifting new proposals for the after-war reconstruction period," he said, "no time should be lost in putting these three well-vested measures into operation. Ours is a work of construction. It is now a matter of peculiarly vital importance to the nation that this country catch up with the constructive labor legislation long since adopted in other countries."

END HEARINGS IN CHICAGO STOCKYARDS CONTROVERSY

Deplorable Conditions Are Revealed Among the Laborers in Chicago 'Jungles' Who Help Monopolists Accumulate Enormous Fortunes.

CHICAGO, March 14.—After hearing the testimony of witnesses on both sides for several weeks, Judge Alschuler, arbitrator in the controversy between the "Big Five" packers and their employees, has taken the matter under consideration, and it is expected that a decision will not be rendered for several weeks.

The workers demanded an eight-hour day, a dollar a day increase in wages, time and a half for overtime and double time for Sunday and holiday work.

There were other demands covering the adjustment of grievances, protection of workers against discrimination on account of union activities, etc. Most of these did not go to arbitration. The packers in an effort to stem the tide of public indignation that was rising about them, granted the minor demands.

For thirteen years the packers have ruled these workers as no Russian autocrat ever dared to rule the workers of Russia. This power is now slipping out of their hands. They accounted it the better part of valor to relinquish some of it without a fight, hoping thereby to appear not so bad as they were about to be painted by the gruesome record of their profit-squeezing methods.

The investigation revealed a condition of poverty and misery among the stockyard workers that is most appalling. Mothers of five or six children testified that they were compelled to lock their children up in their grimy rooms and enter the packing houses as workers in order to help their husbands earn food for their families. And the startling fact was revealed that the combined wages of father and mother was not sufficient to buy enough food to keep the children from going to bed hungry.

Mrs. Josephine Sula told the arbitrator through an interpreter that her six children had often went to bed hungry, after being huddled together around a cold stove all day, caring for themselves as best they might, while she and her husband were helping to make the twenty million dollars that Mr. Armour "earned" in 1917. She said she does not own a hat and has not bought one during the eleven years she is in this country. She owned one in the old country, but since she and her husband worked for the packers she couldn't afford to buy one. When asked by Frank P. Walsh if she would like to have one, she said she would rather have food for her children. She said she never had woolen underwear for her children, never went to the movies, never visited the public parks or the lake front, never saw the statue of Abraham Lincoln, the emancipator of slaves.

Low Wages and Brutality Rule. Other witnesses gave similar testimony, all revealing the appalling conditions of servitude that have prevailed in the stockyards since the destruction of the union in 1893.

John Kikuluski, organizer of the American Federation of Labor, made an impassioned plea for the stockyard slaves. He said: "I want to protest against the clubbing and beating of the laborers at the hands of the guards and watchmen if they happen to be a little late in falling in line," he said. "I wish to protest against the use of vile epithets by these men to foreigners lured here by unscrupulous agents, and who left the old country to escape the oppression of autocratic governments."

The Rev. Grudinski, a Polish Catholic priest, told of the poverty "back of the yards" and of his efforts in behalf of the poor. He told of the many children who have to go to the county agent to get shoes, thus revealing the deplorable condition wherein the taxpayers were contributing to the support of the employes of the big packers.

What It Costs to Live. A budget covering the bare needs of a family of five was introduced by the workers. According to this budget the cost of keeping a family of that size is \$1,288.84. The present income of the vast majority of the stockyard workers, if they work ten hours every one of the 300 working days, is \$225.50. Thus the stockyard laborers, getting 27 1/2 cents an hour are receiving \$463.34 less than enough to exist. And expert witnesses, working men's wives, testified that this budget of \$1,288.84 is too low. They took the items up singly and showed that in a number of them the amount allowed was too small.

Miss Heimbauer, expert statistician from Washington, presented budgets obtained from the Bureau of Labor statistics and others sources. Her figures showed that the minimum amount on which a family could live at \$1,300 to \$1,700 a year. She showed that the most necessary food materials had increased 90 to 102 per cent since 1910. She quoted the New York health department as saying that a man must have at least \$1,600 a year to support a wife and three children in health.

In the face of all this testimony the packers, through their hiring attorneys, superintendents, and "welfare workers," fought bitterly against any bettering of the conditions of their workers.

Cost of a Pound of Meat. The following figures, showing the wages per pound of meat and the profits the packers make on each pound of meat, are extremely interesting. They show how little a raise in wages for the poor enslaved stockyard workers will affect the actual cost of a pound of meat. It will be observed that Swift & Co. takes in profits five thousandths of a cent more than the amount paid to labor for producing the finished product.

These tabulations were produced by the packers at the demand of the workers, who wanted the arbitrator

and the public to get this very important information. The figures follow:

On the wages question the packers contended that they were paying as much as the Steel trust. No doubt the Steel trust would quote the packers' wage scale if the workers rebelled against their enslavement.

The packers endeavored to meet the workers' demand for an eight-hour day with the contention that they could not fill the government orders on an eight-hour basis. To this the workers made answer that they are willing to work the same hours they now work, except that for time worked over eight hours they shall receive time and a half.

Charge Farmers Are Flied. One of the objections raised by the packers to any change in the hours was the alleged difficulty they would have in handling heavy runs of stock. The workers contended that the packers controlled the heavy runs of stock and that heavy runs were the deliberate work of the packers who thus made for themselves the excuse to flich the farmers, by cutting prices. The workers maintained that under an honest administration of the packing houses there would be a regular inflow of stock and there would be nothing to fear from that source, and that they could work overtime in such an emergency.

Investigations revealed that the farmers too are being robbed by the packers, who control the price of stock as arbitrarily as they do the price of labor. And this control of price extends with equal force to the consumer.

Thus there exists a condition where five men absolutely control one of the principal industries of the country, owning untold wealth and power for themselves out of the sweat and blood of farmers and workers.

Last year, Armour and Swift accumulated more than sixty-two million dollars. That sum of money was wrung from the people by monopolistic middlemen who have worked themselves in between the farmers, the workers and the consumers on the highways of commerce, taking toll from all who come within their power.

Should such a condition continue to exist? It is plain that it should not, and the organized farmers and workers are demanding a change. It is significant that at one stage of the proceedings the stockyard workers broke up negotiations with the packers and went to Washington and demanded that the government take over the packing industry.

The farmers through the Nonpartisan league, are pledged to the elimination of the middlemen from the industry. Thus it appears that the intelligent, organized body of the people will not long continue to tolerate the conditions revealed by the investigation of the packers.

NO ADVANTAGE IN HEALTH OF RURAL CHILD OVER CITY NEW YORK, March 14.—Neither the rural child nor the city child has any advantage over the other in the matter of health, according to the February Child Labor Bulletin, published by the National Child Labor committee. In an article on "The Draft as a Test of the Nation's Physical Stamina," by Edward N. Clopper an analysis of the per cent of men rejected for physical reasons in the draft shows that exactly the same per cent (26.6) were rejected from rural and from urban districts. Recent studies of rural school children have tried to prove that the country child is not as healthy and robust as the city child, due largely to the fact that more measures have been taken by the cities for the preservation of children's health. The draft figures show that the country boy is still holding his own but that he has no margin and that unless the rural districts follow the example of the cities in taking care of their children, the cities will soon outdistance them.
