more than any previous week's record. This large output was due to the fact that the mines in the district worked nearly 96 per cent full capacity. And the loss caused by labor shortage, car shortage, and mine disability was 9,323 tons.

"The mine-workers, recognizing that this is no time for shirking or slackening, have responded nobly to the slogan of the president of the Mine Workers of America for a 'full eight hours' work each day and for six days a week," said James B. Neale, director of production, United States Fuel Administration. "The employers for their part have responded to the mine-workers' desire to work as many hours as possible. They are seeing to it that there is no loss of production through mine disability which care and skill might have avoided."

The new draft will further reduce the number of mine-workers, and every day will increase the consumption of fuel. Thus the men who are toiling underground bear each day a heavier burden of responsibility. They know that failure on their part in this period of supreme crisis means disaster to the nation and to the whole world, and so they are giving their full energies, their whole time, and their best efforts to their country, which must recognize their service in

the war as not less important than that which is given by the soldiers. When history is written the heroes of the coal fields will receive their share of praise with the heroes of the battlefields.

ments of Europe today—but for lack of labor men in congress they are the best that can be put through.

More labor members are needed for the new congress to be elected on November 5. Secretary Morrison has sent out to a great many congressional districts, east and west, the labor records of congressmen who are running for another term. A few of these are excellent; most of them are bad. Yet every possible influence has been brought to bear, the legislative agents of the railroad brotherhoods say, in many of the districts, to split the labor vote by false issues that will serve the purpose of the enemies of organized labor. Some of the best labor centers in the country are possibly going to assassinate labor candidates next month. The tragedy of it is that after all it is the labor movement that is stabbed, not the labor candidate. He will get a job and stay in the movement, but there will be one more anti-labor vote in the house, and in committee of the house, during the two most important years since the republic was founded.

**BURNED LIBERTY BONDS
 WILL BE REPLACED**

Liberty Bonds lost in the recent fires will be replaced, providing the bank at which they were purchased has kept a record of the numbers of the bonds sold, according to instructions received by R. A. Horr, chairman of the executive committee, at the Liberty Loan headquarters, 308 Exchange building, from Governor Wood, of the Ninth Federal district.

An affidavit as to the amount of bonds and a bond covering the total declared lost will have to be filed, after which an investigation will be made. As practically all the bonds lost were purchased through banks which kept a record of the numbers of those sold, a check can be had with little trouble. Unless there is a reasonable doubt as to the loss, a new bond will be issued.

Affidavits and bond forms can be obtained at the offices of the Liberty Loan, 308 Exchange building.

In answer to your inquiry as to how George M. Peterson of Duluth, came to be placed among the Senators that were friendly towards labor legislation in the report that was rendered by the representatives of the Railroad Brotherhood's State Legislative Board, will say, that it was "AN ERROR" and have been instructed to write you as follows:—

"When the Anti-Injunction bill was recommended by the Senate Judiciary Committee for indefinite postponement, Senator Gardner of Brainerd, moved as a substitute motion, that the Anti-Injunction be given its second reading, printed and placed on general orders, Senator Peterson voted to adopt the recommendation of the Senate Judiciary Committee and kill the Anti-Injunction bill, but later when it came up for final passage, Senator Peterson was in favor of its passage.

Senator George M. Peterson introduced two bills that amended the vagrant laws and their purpose was to place in jail any body of workmen that would go out on a strike, but he withdrew them however, when the Minnesota Federation of Labor officials requested him to do so."
