Administration. Large part of increase of \$10,167.85 occasioned by creation of Business Department, which has assumed many duties formerly performed by office of clerk, superintendent, and chief engineer. In addition to the efficiency and promptness in delivery of supplies and making repairs, this department has caused a saving to the Board of Education of upwards of \$60,000.00 through the repairing of the Liberty School, the construction of a roof on the Cobb School, the organization of janitors into crews for repairing, etc.

Auxiliary activities:

1. Medical inspection, increase of \$1,000.00 occasioned chiefly by employment of one additional nurse and increased salaries.
2. Transportation of pupils, increase of \$8,000.00 occasioned by transporting children from growing out-side districts and fire districts.
3. Recreation, increase occasioned by enlargement of program.

Repairs. Increase of \$12,270.94 caused largely by increased cost of material, labor, and repair supplies for stock.

Text Books. The increase of 47.1% in text books in 1918-19 over 1917 was occasioned by the fact that the expenditure in 1917-18 was less than in previous years. The average expenditure for text books from 1914-15 to 1916-17 was \$8,964.66.

Rent. A new expenditure of \$2,749.83 occasioned entirely by transfer of administrative offices from Central High School to the Glencoe Building to make room for the increased enrollment in the Washington and Central High School.

Supplies. The increase of \$14,872.35, or 44.1% from 1917-18 has been occasioned by:

1. Increased cost of materials.
2. Material for \$2,000.00 worth of equipment for new buildings.
3. Repair supplies for stock in store room necessary to prevent small purchases and waste of time.

RETAIL PRICES OF MEAT ARE TOO HIGH, CLAIM

TALK OF STRIKE; LAW IS ENFORCED

French Miners Compel Government to Enact Strong 8-Hour-Day Law.

PARIS, France, July 17.—A threatened strike of mine workers that would paralyze this industry if enacted in parliament making it mandatory for mine operators to enforce the eight-hour law. The operators insisted that the eight hours should be "effective" work, that is, eight hours exclusive of the time for descent, lunch and ascent. The mine workers demanded that these be included in the eight hours and prepared for a general tie-up of the industry. Parliament then made these conditions mandatory.

For the first time in seven years the French mine workers are united. In 1912 a large number withdrew from the national federation because of a dispute over the miners' old pension law, then under consideration. At the last convention of the federation the seceders applied for membership and were again admitted. This unity was necessary because of the manner in which the operators juggled with the national eight-hour law.

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SOLDIERS GIVEN WOMEN'S PLACES

Those Engaged in Heavy Work on Railroads Are First to Be Displaced.

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Steady reduction in the number of women employed by railroads is taking place as the result of demobilization and the return of men to their old jobs. From a high mark of 101,753 women employes Oct. 1, 1918, the number had decreased April 1 to 85,333.

The first women to be let go were those engaged in heavy work in roundhouses and shops. In the clerical occupations, such as ticket selling, where 72 per cent of the women were used, small reduction has taken place, 68,129 still being employed. Statistics compiled by the railroad administration show that 5,000 women were employed in shops and 1,000 in roundhouses in 1918, doing work as boilermakers, blacksmiths and machinists. There were 377 women employed as station agents, 50 as switch tenders, 931 pushing trucks and 513 assigned as watch women.


