Duluth Local No. 55 of the National Federation of Federal Employees is taking keen interest in the campaign of W. L. Carss for the Democratic nomination for congress. In a report to the local members the secretary pays the following tribute to Congressman Carss:

## UNDERWOOD HAD CLOSE CALL; ONLY 1,500 LEAD

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Reports reaching the headquarters of the non-partisan political committee tell of the closeness of the vote for re-nomination of Senator Underwood at the Democratic primaries in Georgia. His former majority was 24,000. At the recent primaries that was reduced to a bare 1,500. That is largely due to his unfavorable record in the senate on labor measures.

President Hall paid a short visit to The Labor World office between trains. He is looking forward to a large convention of the Minnesota State Federation of Labor at Rochester next month. He stated that the unions throughout the state were manifesting unusual interest in the coming meeting.

## UNION LABOR TO SUPPORT MALLON

### Candidate for Lieutenant Governor Is One of Pershing's Hundred Heroes.
