

### RAIL SHOPMENS' STRIKE NEWS IS GIVEN IN BRIEF

Tie-Up Complete Everywhere; Railroad Traffic Hurt.

The government has taken control of the railroads so far as freight is concerned, announcement was made from Washington this week.

The Baltimore & Ohio officials and committees from the shopmen have been in session hoping to make a separate agreement. The success of the meeting is regarded as a possible precursor to other individual settlements.

Eastern railroads are attempting to form company "unions," with strikebreakers playing the leading role as members. Western roads are observing the movement of the eastern roads in this respect.

A strike of 40,000 Canadian shopmen may occur at any moment. One is said to have been authorized.

Fifty maintenance of way employees at Shawnee, Okla. and a number at Moberly, Mo., went out in sympathy with the shopmen Monday.

The system chairman of the Railway Clerks and Freight Handlers have served notice on the labor board that they will use this economic power if their grievances are not promptly settled.

Motor trucks are being used in middle west states to carry mail and freight where railroad equipment has completely broken down. They are being used in Wisconsin, Southern Minnesota, upper Michigan and the Dakotas.

Denison, Tex., was placed under martial law this morning by Governor Neff who ordered five companies of the Texas National Guard to that point. Neff was supported by labor for governor in the last election.

On the oil burning roads on the Pacific coast Governor Stephens of California declares there is a shortage of refrigerator cars and considerable fruit is perishing. That surely can not be charged to the coal strike. It is the shopmen's strike that is really paralyzing transportation.

Passenger service on several Duluth and Twin City trains was curtailed during the week. The N. P. Limited has been taken off every day except Sundays. The Soo night train and the Great Northern afternoon train have been annulled. The Sunday Duluth and Grand Forks train has been discontinued by the Great Northern.

Minneapolis Traffic Association reports that there are 3,000 "bad order" cars in two Minneapolis terminals. No report has been made on the "bad order" cars in Duluth and Superior.

Judge C. E. F. of Fargo in the United States district court has enjoined the sheriff of Slope county along with union shopmen from using other than peaceful means in attempting to keep strikebreakers from working in the Milwaukee shops at Marmarth.

### BUILDING-LOAN SOCIETY VOTES FIRST DIVIDEND

First Three Months' Period Shows Fine Earnings.

Closing three months' business on June 30 the St. Louis County Building & Loan association, through its board of directors, has declared its first dividend. The association is a paying proposition from the outset.

The secretary-treasurer reported at the monthly meeting of the board of directors, held last Monday evening at the association's offices, assets of \$22,417.54, liabilities of \$12,562.60 and a balance of \$9,854.94, the result of three months' business.

The assets consist of loans amounting to \$19,507.96; interest account, \$89.53; prepaid expense, \$60, and cash balance, \$2,769.05. The liabilities consist of accounts payable, \$197.50; notes payable, \$3,000; balance payable on approved loans, \$9,333.10; interest accrued on notes payable, \$32. The actual balance consists of deposits amounting to \$9,845.02 and undivided profits of \$9.92.

During its three months of business the association earned \$207.96 in interest. Its expenses were surprisingly low, amounting only to \$169.50. Interest on deposits at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent per annum was paid in the amount of \$28.54. This was credited as a dividend to stockholders, as every depositor is a stockholder.

Henry Perreault and Lawrence Roske tendered their resignations as members of the board of directors. Stanc Kocinski was elected to succeed Mr. Perreault. The other vacancy will be filled at the next meeting of the board, which will be held August 12.

The board directed the officers to send a communication to every labor union in the city requesting its cooperation and suggesting that a date be assigned to hear a representative of the building and loan association explain the purpose and work of the society and to receive deposits.

A like communication, upon motion of Director John Cyrol, was ordered to be sent to fraternal and beneficial societies.

### SAILORS' UNION TO OPEN OFFICE

Agent Here to Start Campaign of Lakes Organization.

Claude Goshorn of Saugatuck, Mich., arrived in Duluth Wednesday to open an office here for the Sailors' union of the Great Lakes. Mr. Goshorn is clothed with proper credentials duly signed by the officers of the Great Lakes branch of the International Seamen's union.

The Sailors' union has not maintained an office in Duluth or Superior for several years. The coming of Mr. Goshorn at this time foreshadows a campaign of organization at this end of the Great Lakes.

The firemen, oilers and water tenders this week voted to authorize a strike call which will effect the shipping of all carriers claiming membership in the Lake Carriers' association. The union has a contract with passenger steamship lines, car ferries and independent lines and they will not be affected by the strike, if it should be called.

The Lake Carriers' association declared against the Seamen's union and for the so-called "open shop" in 1908. Its ships have been manned largely by non-union men ever since. Wages have been cut by the lake carriers from \$130 to \$80 for able seamen, firemen and oilers. Other lines have cut wages by agreement with the union to only \$85 on the three-watch system. The 12-hour day obtains on lake carrier ships.

The non-union men on the lake carriers' ships voted to strike as well as union men. It will be a 100 per cent strike, Mr. Goshorn declares, but it may not be called until after the coal strike is settled.

An expensive camp is being maintained by the D. & F. R. at Two Harbors to care for less than 100 strikebreakers at work in the shops here.

The camp is located back of the ore docks and guards are on duty at all points of entry. The men are not permitted to enter the city. A moving picture show for the entertainment of the strikebreakers has been installed.

Very few local men are employed and not a single striker has returned to work. Train service has not yet been curtailed, but ore trains are running lighter than before the strike.
