

CRESCENT CITY TO BOND FOR A SCHOOL

WILL ERECT BUILDING FOR COLORED SCHOOL

Hon. Cary Hardee a Visitor—News Notes and Personal Mention of Pleasant People.

CRESCENT CITY, Oct. 23—(Special)—The school trustees have purchased the lot at the corner of Division street and Olive avenue for a new colored school, the building of which will follow the voting of bonds for school building purposes. The lot is ideal as to situation, being a lake front, with large oak shade trees in front. There is 200 feet facing the lake and the lot extends back 150 feet on Olive avenue. Under the new district organization pupils from Huntington now come to the Crescent City school. The board had in view a site that would accommodate the greater number of pupils and be most centrally located. This site will operate in this way except for the pupils coming from the Rossville suburb, who will have nearly a half mile further to go. But the location of the lot and its size and other advantages can not be gainsaid, and the colored people who were consulted concerning the purchase were well pleased.

SAYS DUBLIN ORDERED OUR SHIPS SEARCHED. Sinn Fein Reads Alleged Document Calling for Oversight of Our Crews.

LONDON, Oct. 21—The correspondent at Manchester of The Daily Herald, the labor organ, in a dispatch dated Sunday, says:

"In the course of a speech at an impressive demonstration held here today in favor of self-determination for Ireland, Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein organization and a Sinn Fein member of Parliament, read two secret documents issued by Dublin Castle, one ordering detectives to search the belongings of the crews of all vessels, arriving in Ireland from the United States, and the other declaring that the sailors in all American ships coming to Ireland should be treated as suspects.

"Surely," said Mr. Griffith, "America will have something to say to this."

GETTING EVIDENCE TO JURY TRYING RIOTERS

KNOXVILLE, Oct. 21 (United Press)—The state today continued to make good time in getting before the jury evidence against twenty two men being tried on charges growing out of recent race rioting here.

Jailer Hall identified Jeff Claiborne one of the men being tried, as the mob leader when the jail was stormed. Claiborne, the witness said, acted as recruiting officer for a mob to storm the jail to lynch Maurice Mayes a negro.

JAX. REFUSES FARE RAISE.

Votes Three to One Against Traction Campaign Proposition.

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 22—The amendment to the franchise of the Jacksonville Traction Company permitting the street car company to raise the fare to seven cents was defeated yesterday by a vote of more than three to one. The company did not carry a single ward. In the Tenth ward the vote was 135 for the amendment to 150 against it. This was the best showing made by the street car company in any ward. In the Eleventh ward the vote was more than thirteen to one against the amendment, the total being nine for the amendment and 120 against it.

Total Vote Cast Was 2,532. The total vote cast in the election was 2,532. Of this total there were 628 for the amendment and 1,904 against it. The polls opened at 8 a. m., and closed at sundown at 6:50 p. m. The returns were in the hands of the city registration offices in the city hall by 8:30 o'clock last evening.

WALES SEES NIAGARA

Pushes Button That Lights Up Horseshoe Falls for First Time

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Oct. 21.—The Prince of Wales arrived at Niagara Falls, Ont., last night from Hamilton, and is the guest of Dr. Harry Grant, Park Commissioner of Queen Victoria Park. When the Prince reached Dr. Grant's house he pushed a button that lighted the Horseshoe Falls. It made a wonderful sight, and the first time the Horseshoe Falls have been illuminated. The Prince visited Table Rock

and wanted to go out on it, but Admiral Halsey dissuaded him, owing to the danger entailed.

The Prince's American tour has been tentatively abandoned, owing to the illness of President Wilson. A thousand American citizens went over the Suspension bridge this afternoon to catch a glimpse of the Prince before he took the Canadian gorge trip on a private car.

The Prince said it was likely if President Wilson improved rapidly that he would visit New York city and Washington before sailing for home.

The Prince will decorate returned Canadian soldiers in Queen Victoria Park tomorrow, going to Brantford at night, and will later go to Montreal for a week. He expects to be in Toronto on November 1, 2, and 3, then going to Ottawa.
